### THE COMMON MARKET

order more than once while the great deal of discussion has been going on among farmers and the ordinary man in the street about the Common Market and what it will mean where this country is concerned. Just heard the question posed: "Is Ireland ready or fit to enter the Common Market?" and for even the economists this must be a real six-marker.

When Ireland made application for membership, the Council of Ministers in charge did not accede to it or welcome it in the same way as they did that of Britain and Denmark. Instead it invited a delegation from the Irish Government to visit Brussels for a preliminary exchange of views prior to embarking on formal negotiations. It is furtherance of this invitation that the Minister for Industry, Commerce and Agriculture has just returned to Dublin.

It was widely reported that in the course of the debate on the drafting of the form of reply to Ireland, doubts were expressed as to the economic capability of Ireland to bear up to the strains of full membership, and the willingness of the country to accept the full benefits of the wide range of concessions available under the terms of the Rome Treaty, for an underdeveloped country also caused some disappointment.

It has been said too that some elements in the Common Market regard full membership as undesirable for a country which is not a member of N.A.T.O. but it is not yet known whether this will have any bearing on the negotiations which will precede an entry to E.E.C.

The whole economic future of the country will, however, be largely determined by the outcome of the negotiations which are about to take place, and whatever the outcome, the future of agriculture and industry will be affected and appropriate adjustments will have to be made to meet the new situation.

I will have more to say on the subject next week.

### UNSUITABLE MEETING PLACE

Why are meetings of Waterford County Council now being held at the County Home in Dungarvan, I know that when the Council held its December meeting there one member, half-joking, all earnest declared that they had been driven to the poorhouse by the farmers. Although this may not be correct, the Council certainly looked like the truth. But what were the Council trying to prove by holding the January meeting there last Monday?

The Courthouse, which has been out of commission for an inauspiciously long time and since the renovation work began there last year the Council has been on the scene. First the meetings were held in the hall of the Town Hall, but the Council members found it hard to follow discussions. The problem was solved when the local Urban Council offered its meeting room to the Council. This is a fine room, well-heated and ventilated with a grand round table, and what is important from a reporter's angle it has very good facilities for the press. As a result of the move, the Council members were held here and then for no apparent reason it was decided to move to the County Home.

The room there obviously proved itself to be inadequate at the December meeting and for that reason I cannot understand why the January meeting was held there. Last Monday, the Chairman, who sat at the top of a long narrow table down one side of the room had to call for

## Committee To Report On Rural Water Requirements

### Council Marks Minister's Letter "Read"

That it was the Council's duty to formulate a programme for the development of rural water supplies within the functional area of the Council was stated in a letter from the Minister for Local Government, Mr. N. Blaney which was circulated to members of Waterford County Council at their meeting in Dungarvan on Monday. The Council decided to mark the letter "read" but agreed that the sub-committee of the Council which has been dealing with water supplies draw up a programme and submit it to the Council. A time limit of four months was placed on the Committee.

The Minister's letter which came in reply to a letter from the Secretary of the Council informing him that the Council had decided not to go ahead with any regional water schemes as outlined in the Survey Report submitted by the County Engineer and estimated to cost £2,800,000 stated that the Minister noted that the Council at their meeting on December 11 had decided not to go ahead with these schemes.

"It should be brought to the Council's attention," the letter stated, "that the Report in question, while comprehensive and informative, contains no further investigation as to the feasibility of any regional schemes. It merely indicates areas in which the question of setting up Parish Councils to promote self-help schemes should be considered. The Report suggested two pilot schemes and a discussion between a Committee of the Council and representatives of rural organisations in the area. It is presumed that what was in mind was the further planning of a scheme to be implemented in relation to domestic, agricultural and other demands.

Referring to the Council's decision, the letter said "The resolution appears to be at variance with the policy of the County Council to develop rural water supplies. The County Council has been successful in carrying out in other counties the initiative to set up Parish Councils and contact the various rural organisations to set up machinery to deal with group water schemes. Mr. D. Hally, County Engineer, stated that it would not be sufficient for the Council to implement the Minister's letter. It was essential for the Council to decide on a policy to be adopted towards rural water supplies so that a firm programme could be formulated.

Mr. W. Dower questioned the revenue from all the water schemes carried out during the past five years and said that he believed that it was small.

### LESS THAN HALF

When the letter, which was listed as item six on the agenda, first came before the meeting, there were less than half the Council present and Mr. G. Curran, Chairman, made a suggestion which was agreed that the matter be put back until the attendance got bigger.

One member was heard making a sotto voce remark audible at the Press table: "there's a hole in the bucket!"

At a later stage when more members had turned up, the Chairman returned to the letter and asked for any comments on it.

Mr. J. Quirk said that he was glad now to see that the Government didn't think that the Council had passed the regional scheme and the Chairman expressed the views that the Minister's letter was a reasonable one, the essence of democracy and full of common-sense.

Mr. E. Walsh then proposed and Mr. P. Cahill seconded that the letter be marked "read" and this was agreed.

Mr. Quirk then said that Committees should be formed in different districts throughout the county as the Department now appeared to be agreeable to co-operative schemes in his district (Ballyduff S.O.) and the N.F.A. and Minister Na Tíre had

met to go into the position of the three water schemes in the area which were not now in use. It would be a good thing if the Council, while giving them some help in this regard, the three schemes he referred to had been into disuse due to the regional scheme which was now supplying Lismore and Ballyduff.

### PARISH COUNCILS

Mr. Curran then put forward the suggestion that the Council should take the initiative in having Parish Councils set up in each parish. At the meeting of the Council's sub-committee to investigate the rural water schemes and what was in mind was the further planning of a scheme to be implemented in relation to domestic, agricultural and other demands.

### No Favouritism Involved

At last Monday's Co. Donegal meeting in Dungarvan, Mr. Sean Whelan said that when he made a complaint at the November meeting about cottage repairs in the Ballymore area he wanted to make it quite clear that there was no favouritism involved, for as far as any of the Engineers were concerned.

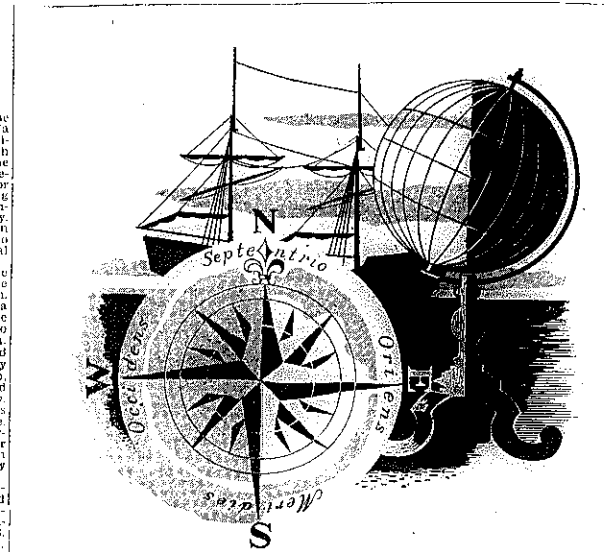
