PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight

FARMERS ON THE MARCH
In recent weeks we have been reading about protest marches organised by farmers in their various county capitals against rising taxation and falling incomes. Here in Waterford the first of such protest marches was staged in Dungarvan and since then similar demonstrations in Wick, Kilkenny, Clonmel and Roscommon, have in themselves been most impressive. The orderly parades which have been a great credit to their organisation have impressed many people, even those who were at first sceptical, by having the desired effect in the places where it counts most—the headquarters of the local authorities and of Government Departments.

BLOOD DONORS
When the Cork Blood Transfusion Service recently visited Dungarvan I was surprised to learn that on each occasion that they came to the district they have to rely on more or less the same donors for the life-giving bottles of blood. I was told that it is the same in most of the districts they visit. The fact was brought home to me that night at the Town Hall when a local doctor called in to see if everything was going alright. As things turned out they were and the response—albeit 28—was gratifying. He remarked to me that most of the faces he saw were familiar—the faces of people he saw on the town most days. A quick glance around confirmed the fact that the men and the women there were all from the urban area.

HORSE PAIR
A lone nag and a group of meek met my gaze in Dungarvan town on Friday evening. When I inquired what was going on I was told that it was the annual show of the horse fair. Admittedly there were a few more animals turned up later, but I reflected on the manner in which the fair has deteriorated in recent years. First the Urban Council used to advertise these fairs but now they disowned them and then the are nobody's baby, with the result that is plain to see. Could not the Dungarvan Development Association do something about properly organising these fairs or just deciding to hold one major fair each year. This is another of those small things which could do good for the town if it was properly handled.

FATAL ACCIDENT IN DUNGARVAN

£1,775 For Dependents Of Deceased Plumber

The issue of whether a plumber engaged on repair works in Dungarvan during which he lost his life was engaged at the time of the fatal accident or a workman was killed by a falling pipe was tried before Mr. B. M. Curran, District Judge, in Circuit Court on Tuesday last. It was an unusual case insofar as one of the witnesses for the applicants was the respondent to the claim.

£100 SETTLEMENT FOR TALLOW BOY
Judge Pavitt at Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday afternoon a settlement for £100 to be paid to the dependents of a 5-year-old boy who was killed by a falling pipe on a job on Mr. Fleming's roof. James Mullins, 28, of the town, was the father of the deceased. The boy, who was named as James Mullins, was employed by Mr. Fleming as a workman at £12 a week. His case was that at the time he was employed by Mr. Fleming on a job on Mr. Fleming's roof, the roof was being dismantled and while doing so a pipe fell from the roof and struck the boy on the head. He had been 8 days in hospital. He had made a very good recovery.
