Despite countless warnings and the efforts of various organizations to draw attention to the dangers many people lose their lives in drowning accidents every summer. Last year the fatalities averaged one per week over the entire season.

One of the main reasons for the failure of these warnings lies in the fact that they are not directed to them. They are always for the other fellow and not for me.

Everyone, young and old, should pay attention to these warnings as they concern all. If you are a non-swimmer do not go out beyond your depth. If you can swim try to keep your head above water in these conditions can quickly induce cramp which may lead to fatal consequences.

Remember too that foolish people who do not heed these warnings and who persist in taking all sorts of chances are not only endangering their own lives but also the lives of the brave people who must go to their assistance. In the past many a gallant swimmer has sacrificed his life in a rescue attempt. So now make sure you come summer by being conscious of the proper things to do and by always doing them.

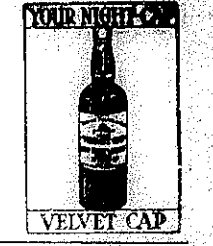

COUNTY COUNCIL HAS NO AUTHORITY TO BUY MACHINERY ON HIRE PURCHASE BASIS

Criticisms By Local Government Auditor

In submitting a report on his audit of the accounts of the County Council for the year ended March 31, 1951, Mr. Frank Logan, Government Auditor, made several criticisms and ordered a surcharge in the amount of £31,138.6d. on the accounts which was circulated to the members of the Council with a view to their approval at the meeting held on Monday 28th. Copies of the report were made available to the Press at last Monday's meeting.

Receipts for the year under review, according to the report, amounted to £1,047,117 made up as follows:—Rates, £427,251; State Grants, £317,093; Dungarvan Urban District, £15,591; Other Receipts, £287,272. Expenditure totalled £1,023,960 as follows:—Rates, £411,854; Public Assistance and Health, £544,539; Housing, £100,045; Municipal and General Purposes, £179,544; Town Charges, etc., £1,956.

Referring to the general financial position of the Council, the Auditor stated that although there was an improvement in the position it was still unsatisfactory and called for continued vigilance on the part of the Council to liquidate the adverse balance and to provide an adequate reserve to meet all the services to be maintained with the minimum resources to be available.

The quarterly meeting of Waterford County Council due to be held on Monday 19th, May last, was adjourned without transacting any business for the purpose of agreeing to refer to the Council Manager, Mr. B. J. McGeogh, who has been in the charge of the accounts since the death of his sister, Mrs. M. Hayes, which occurred at Adare, Co. Limerick.

When the members convened for the meeting, the Chairman, Mr. C. Curran, informed them of the receipt of the report of the Auditor and that it was the usual procedure in such circumstances to refer the report to the Council. The members agreed to this course and a vote of sympathy to the Manager was then proposed and passed by the Council.

The Chairman referring to the statement of Mr. J. Linnan at the meeting, said that although he had been active on other bodies in recent weeks, he was not in a position to attend the meeting of the County Council he had attended since his recent illness.

Mr. Curran said that he would like to extend a warm welcome to Mr. Linnan. He has been a big loss during his absence and I know I am speaking for all the members and for the people of the County when I say that Mr. Linnan has always been very devoted to the interests of the public.

TRAVELLING EXPENSES
It was stated that the report went on to state that the travelling expenses for the County Engineer's visit to the County Council were calculated at a mileage rate for a car. As the payment in question was made in the absence of legal authority, I would have been obliged to surcharge the amount as an illegal payment, but for the fact that the sum was recovered and lodged to the credit of the Council on 6th December, 1951.

ROAD WIDENING
Referring to compensation allowed during road widening operations, it was stated that two orders, approved by the Council, were ordered and carried for payment out of the Council's funds by the County Engineer and were paid for on 9th December, 1951. Our investigation into the reason for the inclusion of this payment in the Council's accounts, the County Engineer, on the 19th October, 1951, stated that the payment was in respect of gates supplied as part of the agreed compensation for land acquired by the County Council for road-widening. On the 21st October, 1951, the County Engineer's attention was directed to the fact that the agreement, approved by the Council, provided that the compensation for the land acquired was £1,400 15s. 6d. and that the building of 100 broad yards of concrete block wall, 4 feet high, and two sets of entrance piers, were to be erected at the cost of the County Council. The County Manager's approval was obtained by the County Engineer, in consideration of the various explanations submitted by the County Engineer in the matter. It is apparent that the County Engineer on his own initiative and without the prior approval of the local authority, decided to allow as additional compensation for the land acquired, a pair of gates and also to farm, on the avenue and also to farm, on the ground around the house. The Kilrossanty backs appeared but to no avail and Justin Spratt goalied from the kick. Whether or not the referee's decision was a proper one will like a similar decision on a more famous occasion remain in the bone of contention whenever the game is discussed.
