PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight

WHAT PRICE SUPERVISION Readers will note with interest a report elsewhere in this issue of a discussion which took place at last Monday's quarterly meeting of Waterford County Council on the proposal to set up a direct labour organization to deal with the building of 40 or 50 labourer's cottages and what is entailed.

Due to the fact that it has proved impossible to obtain tenders from contractors to build these cottages, the Council, very rightly, were unanimous in supporting a motion to go ahead with the job by direct labour. This motion was sponsored by members of the Labour Party. The official reaction came in the form of two amendments to the motion on the agenda—the appointment of a clerk of works to me at any rate it seems rather ridiculous and unreasonable that the Council's existing engineering staff should be increased and a clerk of works appointed just to supervise the building of 40 or 50 cottages in various areas throughout the county. I say this in all sincerity. Besides, the Council are nine assistant engineers at present operating in the County. There are four districts for the purpose of supervision and as the building is about 100 cottages to west, and 35 to 40 miles at its greatest depth, four engineers should be appointed to supervise all the work done in the districts. There is one engineer whole-time in charge of the Council's machinery yard in Dungarvan where he supervises a most efficient machinery year round. There is another engineer seconded to the Health authority to inspect and supervise whatever work is necessary in the various hospitals and institutions in the county. There are, I think, a couple of spares who are used as the occasion arises. Surely amongst this staff it could be possible to find someone who could, without unduly taxing the efficiency of the staff, take over the job of supervising the building of 40 or 50 cottages.

Why should it be necessary to employ an extra engineer and clerk of works at an additional cost of approximately £2,000 a year to do this small job. I think the attitude is typical of the modern attitude of official quarters.

I am glad the Council rejected the proposal to increase the staff and in their wisdom they saw fit to recommend the Manager to make one of the existing engineers be transferred to carry out the work. I trust also that the Manager will see fit to honour the Council's recommendation.

garn so in view of the present filthy, torn streets of the town which in dry weather are covered with dust and in wet weather are mud-puddled, while all the time in different places we have bubbling water coming up from broken pipes. We are heavily handicapped from the work going on. Last Sunday afternoon, I was approached by a resident who expressed disgust at the condition of the streets. From what I saw I could not disagree with him. Besides the pot-holed condition there appeared to be hundreds of paper covers and wrappers flying around. The place looked sorry, unkempt, and unattractive for anyone in charge who is responsible for, not only the condition but the appearance of the streets. After all Dungarvan is the county town. It is a centre of importance. The ratepayers, goodness knows, pay heavily for the services they are supposed to get. It is no more to look for some proper supervision and a little bit of speed in getting things done.

Certainly I had to smile when I saw Dungarvan named as an entry in the Towns Competition. I smiled to think of the naïveté of the Town Officials who think they can fool the Bord Fáilte adjudicators with what we have to offer.

County Council To Spend £22,500 More On Roads

New Move Will Put 1/1 On Next Year's Rates

There was a sequel to the striking of this year's rate by Waterford County Council at the Council's quarterly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday when it was agreed by 10 votes to 7 to spend an extra £22,500 to that already provided on roads in the County during the coming year. The additional expenditure will not affect the rate of 45/8 struck by the Council at their estimates meeting in March, but it will mean an increase of 1/1 on the rates for next year in addition to the amount which will normally have to be provided. In the course of the discussion on the matter at Monday's meeting, it was stated by the Chairman, Mr. C. Curran, that the N.F.A. had no objection to any proposal which would obviate the dismissal of road-workers. A member remarked that from all they had heard about the N.F.A. it must be the N.F.A. who were ruling the chair.

It was not even clear, he said, who were the educational policy makers. The Department of Education claimed to be mainly administrative in character and it was his, surely the parents should have the widest choice of life they must lead in ten or twenty years time.

Mr. Curran at the outset said that if there were any brick-bats on the occasion of the meeting he suggested that he be directed to him rather than to the Council. He then read a prepared statement in which he said:

On the occasion of the meeting it was clear that there was a grave danger that the Council, in its eagerness to resist a rate increase, would make a decision which would result in this body surrendering to the Government and disastrous consequences would ensue. I am sure that we should use any legitimate device to prevent this.
