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# Paradise For White Collar Workers Being Created

## Health Auth. Member Charges Officials With Convassing

Of the 21 items on the agenda for the monthly meeting of the Waterford Health Authority held in Dungarvan last Monday, 12 dealt with applications for wage increases from doctors, nurses, health inspectors and other workers employed by the Authority. One member said that it looked as if all those who had not already got their increases were trying to get in before the Authority clamped down on granting any more white collar said that a paradise for white collar workers was being created in the country. All but two of the applications were granted and the total cost of paying the new increases was stated to be £2,892 a year.

At the August meeting of the Board, a resolution was passed that as from November no further applications for increases would be considered except at the meeting preceding the annual estimates meeting. Referring to this at last Monday's meeting, Mr. S. J. Moylan, Manager, pointed out that the Authority had about 800 employees in 108 different grades and were represented by about 10 Unions. From these figures it was not difficult to understand that it would almost be impossible to deal with applications from all at one meeting. The numbers made it an absolute necessity to deal with them piecemeal.

Mr. G. Curran—Practically all have got increases during the past year and surely you are not anticipating another round. Manager—hope not.

At the moment the other medical officers were on what was termed a "non-inclusive" salary scale. The Minister had refused to grant them increases to try to force them into the "inclusive" salary scale under which the doctors could be taxed. The doctors themselves did not want inclusive salaries.
