At last week's meeting of the Dungarvan Council, Mr. Michael Pites was re-elected Chairman for the tenth successive year, surely a great tribute to Mr. Pites' popularity. Mr. H. R. Dowd, who since he entered public life has consistently championed the cause of the public for better conditions and higher wages, feels that the demands for more increases by the officials. The members were asked to sign a petition to the Health Authority, but they were told that this was not put to these applications soon there would be revolution.

Salary Increase System Criticised

Mr. H. R. Dowd, a champion in the cause of higher salaries and better conditions for public officials in the past hit out against the continued agitation by officials for more and more increases at the monthly meeting of the Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan on last Saturday. They had reached the position, he said, where it was becoming a bit of a racket. The Committee unanimously decided to cut from the annual estimates any provision for further increases in the salaries of Instructors in Agriculture, Horticulture and Poultry Keeping beyond the normal annual increments.

The provisional estimates for the year 1963/64 totalling £23,448 were presented to the Committee by Mr. L. Dempsey, Inspector, Department of Agriculture, and showed an increase of £3,555 over last year's figure which stood at £19,893.

The main heads of increases were as follows:—
 Instruction in Agriculture increased by £2,100 from £1,820 to £3,920.
 Instruction in Horticulture increased by £200 from £1,000 to £1,200.
 Poultry-keeping increased by £152 from £2,280 to £2,432.
 Administrative expenses increased by £100 from £1,000 to £1,100.
 Horticulture increased by £100 from £1,000 to £1,100.

£11,500 FOR RECONSTRUCTION WORK AT ARDKEEN HOSPITAL

Officials Warned Not To Anticipate Board's Approval In Future

In the course of a discussion on a proposal to raise a loan of £11,500 for reconstruction work at Ardkreen Hospital at last Monday's meeting of the Waterford Health Authority in Dungarvan it was revealed that extensive repairs were required to many of the various units which comprise the hospital. It was also revealed that the amount of the loan was originally put down at £22,500 but since the Board had approved it had a discussion with the Manager and was advised that the loan should be reduced to £11,500.

Mr. T. Lannen commenting that he was only 15 years since Ardkreen Hospital was built at a cost of over £1 million, asked what the loan was now required for.

Mr. Hynes said that the work to be done was not to the original fabric of the hospital but to its adaptation for use as a general hospital. It included such additions as an operating and orthopaedic units.
