PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight

ARE BOTH OF THESE NECESSARY
A question which has been raised on more than one occasion and which has now been again asked in the Irish Spectator, the trade journal of the Association of Irish Hotel Owners. Do we need both the Irish Tourist Association and Bord Fáilte Éireann? At least one local public representative has been fair and honest in his reply to this query and he has, whenever the opportunity was afforded to do so, been very frank in his opinion. He is the Hon. Mr. Norman Walsh, C.D., and his opinion in the matter must be accepted as a considered one based on first-hand experience as he was the representative of Waterford County Council on the Association for a number of years. Mr. Walsh always criticised, and I thoroughly agreed with him and still do that for his size Ireland has a multiplicity of organisations which are duplicating the efforts of others.

Nowhere can we find a greater example of this duplication than in Bord Fáilte and the I.T.A. Both bodies apparently pledged themselves to the same purposes. The bulk of the funds for the I.T.A. are contributed by various County Councils and Urban Councils and Corporations throughout Ireland and in 1962 the total of all these amounted to £22,377.

Biggest individual contributions come from counties on the Western seaboard which send £10,000 from the tourist trade, £1,750 and Kerry £1,125. Waterford's contribution amounts to £415 and by comparison Kildare contributed £100, Kilkenny £250, Laois £250, Longford and Leitrim £100 each, and Monaghan £50.

From this it can be seen that Waterford are not being neglected by the I.T.A. and they will for the return, if any, which it is claimed they get. I think it is high time that

The Message Of Fatima
Magnificent Production By
Dungarvan Presentation
Convent Pupils

After a lapse of more than thirteen years the Sacred Musical Pageant "The Message Of Fatima" was revived with success by the pupils of the Presentation Convent, Dungarvan. Those who saw the original production of the pageant in May, 1948, will remember it as one of the finest seen in the town up to that time. However, for colour, staging and presentation last week's effort must have far outstripped that of 49.

From the smallest of the little actresses on stage to the vee speakers who recorded the passage of time and untold the story of the Apparitions of the Blessed Virgin to the three peasant Portuguese children at Fatima in 1917, it could not have been more perfect.

The stage settings were done in masterly fashion while the lighting effects, especially in the final vision scene, when the sun danced and revolved miraculously in the sky over the thousands who had gathered in Fatima on the occasion were most realistic. The programme did not reveal who was in charge of the settings or effects, but they must be given the marks for doing an excellent job.

Next comes the costumes. These provided a wonderfully technical effect and all the frocks and costumes blended in most harmonious style. The effect of the overall was only really in the tableaux which terminated the pageant and which for taste, colour and setting could not be excelled and provided a fitting climax to a grand production.

CENTRAL FIGURES
Central figures of the pageant of course were the three children to whom Our Lady appeared, Jacquette Walsh was the happy choice. She moved gracefully in the tableaux for the part, while as her little companions, Francisco and Lucia, little girls of 10 and 11, Mary Clithan, amazed everyone by their natural manner on the stage. 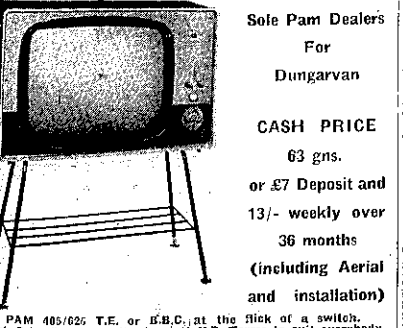

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A GREAT INSTITUTION
Mr. A. H. Farrell, Solicitor, Dungarvan, who has been Hon. Secretary of the Irish Life-Boat Institution for many years, has received the following letter from the Secretary of the Institution dated November 28th.

"This is a great institution which carries out year in, year out, and how they have come to rely on the help of Irish people to assist them."

"Dear Mr. Farrell—I have received your letter regarding the statement of your account of our Nettle Head Branch. Once again many calls have been made on our life-boat crews, this year, but that is something which now has to be recorded as a fact of life. It is a remarkable fact that whereas before the last war, when there were many more life-boat crews, life-boats went out on service on average between 300 and 400 times a year, and during the war the average figure was only a little over 600. Today we expect life-boats to go out at least 200 times a year as a matter of course."

"Nevertheless the number of deaths which occur at sea every year is still alarmingly high, and the fact that the life-boat crews are seeking to reduce the toll, this year, for instance, we lauded a scheme to collect the aid of boat owners in saving life, and other projects are under consideration. There are many ways in which you can help to explain why our expenditure must exceed a million pounds a year, and I am sure you will be ever delighted that your branch has done such a wonderful year, and your very grateful thanks for your honorary treasurer, Mr. Paul J. Power, who has done so much to help you in different ways. In particular, I know how much we owe to you personally."
