**MY CHRISTMAS WISH**  
As this is the last issue of the Leader to reach you before the Holy Season of Christmas, may I extend to you dear reader, and to all my friends the wish that God may shower His choicest blessings on you and yours that goodwill, peace and prosperity may be yours now and always.

**SILENT NIGHT**  
The story of how the world-famous Christmas hymn "Silent Night, Holy Night" came to be written is now pretty generally known, but a brief account of the event, said to be written down in the hand-writing of Franz Gruber, who wrote the music, adds a new interest.

Rev. Fr. Joseph Mohr, a young priest and Franz Gruber, an organist in Fr. Mohr's church, are the names in this story. The priest's Oberndorf in Upper Austria, Fr. Mohr wrote the words to an immortal hymn. He had received training as a chorister in Salzburg Cathedral, the son of an obscure master on week-days, and travelled back and forth from a neighbouring village to play the organ in Fr. Mohr's church on Sundays.

Together, racing against time, one Christmas Eve more than a century ago to provide the choir of their church with a new hymn for midnight Mass, these two retiring men gave to the world a masterpiece of their art, the sweetness of their mountain homes.

The account attributed to Franz Gruber, and said to have achieved widespread popularity is as follows:

It was on the twenty-fourth of December, in the year 1818, that Joseph Mohr, at that time the assistant priest in the newly erected parish of St. Nicholas in Oberndorf brought a poem to Franz Gruber, the official school organist (at that time also the schoolmaster in Armsdorf), with the request that he write a melody suited to the poem, for two solo voices and a choir with guitar accompaniment.

The same evening the latter recited this music-loving priest with his simple composition, in accordance with his request. This was sung that very night, and was received with great favour.

There then you have the story behind this great Christmas hymn which with the Adagio lyrics as no other hymn does, the great spirit and message of Christmas.

**ALMOST A MILLION**  
The provisional estimates for the Health Services in Waterford City and County were considered by the members of the Health Authority in Dungarvan on Wednesday. As I have to write this column before the meeting is held I cannot say what the ultimate outcome will be but I have seen a copy of the estimate and can comment.

The total bill to be met as far as I can figure out from the maze of figures is £913,856 or about £1,000,000. It is a staggering estimate of the total, roughly one-quarter goes to paying salaries and travelling expenses.

The estimates for running the various hospitals make interesting reading. Topping the bill of course is Ardkeen with a £12,000 gross in wages and salaries. Food and drink account for £14,000 and heating and lighting £12,000 and postage and telephones £2,570. Major items here are heating £2,700. Estimated to cost £50,000 is the running of the County Home in Dungarvan, and of this £18,500 will go out in salaries and wages, £18,000 on food; £5,500 on heating and lighting.

**HAD UNLAWFULLY CAPTURED SALMON**  
Declan Mulcahy, 57, Congress Hill, Dungarvan, and Thomas Kelly, 75, Congress Villas, Dungarvan, pleaded guilty to a charge of having four salmon and one sea trout in their possession at Knockree, Coligan, on September 20, which had been unlawfully captured.

Mr. Power, solicitor for the Fishery Conservators, said that sergeant Hayes and Garda D. Halley had stopped two men on a motor bicycle and saw the fish sticking out of a bag. The marks on the fish showed that they had been killed with a spear of fish.

Mr. A. V. Maher, solicitor for defendants, said that both were employees at the local leather factory and had been trying to implement their income during the recent strike in this way. As they had admitted the offence when they might have been able to contest it, he asked the Justice to deal with them leniently.

Mr. Power said that Mulcahy had been previously convicted in March 1960 and fined £3 with £2-15-0 expenses.

The Justice fined Mulcahy £2 and £1 in respect of each fish with £3-10-0 costs, and Kelly £1 and 10/- in respect of each fish with £3-10-0 costs.

He allowed both 2 months in which to pay the fines.

MINISTER'S ACTION WAS UNDEMOCRATIC Local Representatives Have No Say

The system under which salary increases are at present granted to instructors again came under fire at last Saturday's meeting of the Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan. During a discussion on the subject the General Council of Committees of Agriculture were criticised while it was also stated that a conflict of opinion existed among agricultural organisations in the county as to whether additional permanent Agricultural Instructors were needed or not.

Foran, Chairman of the Committee, said that he had received the letter and that he was in favour of the proposed increase. 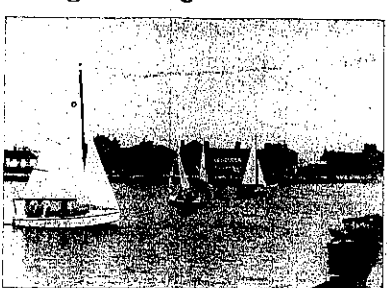

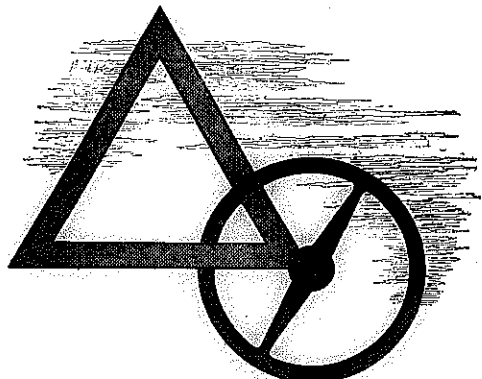
