THE URBAN RATE

Ratepayers in Dungarvan will read elsewhere in this issue of the Leader a full report of the estimates meeting of the Dungarvan Urban Council at which the rate of 48.8d. was struck for the coming year. The new rate represents an increase of 4d. over last year and a cut of 4d. in the figure of 49/- requested by the County Manager.

Although this might seem a small increase it does not mean that the gross expenditure has come up by only an equivalent 22.4d. since last year. It has in fact gone up by almost 50d. and the fact that there has been an increase in valuations in the urban area has kept the rate in line at an amount looking small.

What should of course have happened is that the old rate of 48.8d. should have been reduced by 1/- and the officials operated to the full instead of blocking every suggestion to make reductions, this could well have happened.

There is no doubt but that Councillor Lannen was on the target when he wanted to cut the amount estimated to pay E.S.B. charges for pumping at the new water scheme, but his every move was foiled to get a reduction in this.

WILL CALL FOR SUSPENSION OF GO. MANAGER

Showed Scant Respect For Wishes of Council

Echoes of a rather heated discussion which took place at last month's Estimates meeting of Waterford County Council concerning the efficiency of the Engineering Department and an overwhelming 14 votes to 2 decision calling on the Co. Manager to reduce the Engineering Staff by two (from 10 to 8) reverberated through the Council Chamber again at the Council's monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday. On this occasion members challenged the Manager for failing to carry out the terms of the resolution and one member said that he was prepared to move a motion calling for the Manager's suspension.

The matter arose when Mr. John Fahy asked whether the Co. Manager had made any moves to implement the terms of the resolution contained in the motion passed by the Council at the Estimates meeting calling for a reduction from 10 to 8 in the number of Engineers employed.

Mr. N. Walsh—Didn't you see the advertisements in the papers. Instead of letting any go they're looking for one extra. That's their answer to us.

Mr. S. J. Moynihan, Co. Manager, said that the position in this regard was that one of the engineering staff had resigned and the advertisement was for a replacement for him.

Mr. Fahy said that the Manager would avail of the situation to get a little part of the Council to meet the case. As it was he had shown a complete disregard for the wishes of the Council.

DUNGARVAN RATE INCREASE

Manager Asks For £36,179 To Run Town

Members of Dungarvan Urban Council spent well over two hours discussing an estimate of £36,179 requiring a rate of 49/- submitted by the Co. Manager at their annual estimates meeting on last Friday night. The Manager's estimate was an increase of 8d. on the current rate (48/4) but in the end the Council by 4 votes to 3 "split the difference" and adopted a rate of 48/8d., a cut of 4d. on the amount submitted by the Manager and an increase of 4d. over last year.

Mr. Walsh—I'll spend only if I get value for a good bargain. Mr. Lannen—Well I wouldn't be one for giving a man with a good salary an increase of £3 a week. We have a bigger income from rates this year but the population is down by 900 since 1956. Sure the people are flying out of the town because the rates are so high.

Mr. J. Kyne, T.D., Chairman remarked: "The people are flying out of every part of Ireland. North and South."

Mr. Lannen—It's a tragedy, isn't it.

NEW WATER SCHEME

Discussing the new water scheme, Mr. Lannen said that it would be able to rely on a stand-by pump at the borehole at Ballinacree in case of a breakdown.

Mr. Kyne replied that he did not think this would be necessary as the water-tower would shortly be completed and in case of an E.S.B. failure they would be able to rely on that.

Mr. P. Walsh, S.E., Town Engineer, said that this was not altogether true as the tower would only take 250,000 gallons which would only keep the town going for a few days.

On the question of pumping costs, the Acting Town Clerk, Mr. E. White, said that at present these were high because the pump was going all the time but when the tower came into operation it would be possible for them to avail of the lower E.S.B. charges for off-peak periods.

Mr. Lannen felt that it would be possible to cut the estimate for pumping by £300 or approximately 6d. in the £2. It should be possible for the Council to get the benefit of a lower rate from the E.S.B.

Mr. Lannen thought this would be taking too much for granted. He did not feel there was any need to install a stand-by diesel generator as there were two pumps installed at the town and one was capable of delivering all the water required. Any E.S.B. failure would occur, would be very short duration.

Mr. Lannen said that it was not unreasonable to expect a saving of from £300 to £400 in the E.S.B. bill for pumping once the scheme was completed and he proposed that they deduct this amount as equivalent to 6d. in the £2 from the estimate.

The Town Engineer said he did not see this as a saving. In reply to a question by the Chairman, the Town Engineer agreed that there would likely be a saving in the pumping costs but he could not say how much it would be.

Chairman—Would there be a saving equivalent to 2d. in the £2 on that.

The Manager said that he would accept a cut such as that suggested by the Chairman provided the Engineer was satisfied with it.

Mr. Lannen—Well I'll still be proposing a cut of 6d. in the £2 on that.

LICENSE FEES LOW

Mr. J. Kennedy drew attention to the income from licenses: £1 from slaughter licenses and £5 from the cinema and petrol licenses. They were, he said, very low.

Mr. Lannen drew attention to a sum of £23,200 in the General Purposes Account for salaries and pensions. This figure, he said, showed an increase of £450 since 1958, an equivalent of 5d. in the £2 on the rates. As he never voted for these increases, he now proposed that they cut a slice of them.

Chairman—Can't accept that as the Council as a whole have already voted for them.

Mr. Lannen—There's proposed that a cut of 6d. in the £2 be made in the water pumping charges and that 2d. be cut from the General Purposes Charges.

Mr. Whelan seconded.

COST OF ROAD MAINTENANCE
