**PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight**

**THE CHALLENGE**

On a circular letter issued from the Urban Office in Dungarvan last week I was challenged on my article about the Dungarvan Urban Council. Mr. T. A. Kyne, T.D., the Deputy apparently thought that this letter would be suppressed in the Leader and sent it to at least one other paper but as he and the readers of the Leader generally have seen his suspicions in this regard, I am not surprised to find this week the example set by the Deputy last week has been followed by another member of the Council, Mr. R. A. Walsh, who in an effort to share the limelight jumps on the same bandwagon.

Here indeed are challenges from most formidable adversaries. The Deputy is an old campaigner who in his young days found as much to castigate as to praise. He is a man of letters and a man of action. He is a man who has made no bones that his attitude generally towards rates is to increase them. He is a man who is a comparative newcomer to public affairs but possesses to a high degree the ability to hold expert views on general topics among them local administration and traffic regulations. So we are not surprised that he has been a great consolation to me to have had so many personal callers, and messages, and letters from the ratepayers of the urban area thanking me in this matter.

A certain picture has been painted for the public on this matter of the rates and Councilors by the Deputy and Walsh. It is stated in some of the things they said, in particular their references to the power of the Council. The Deputy is true although the local representatives will have power to strike a rate, or as he puts it himself, to say how much to be spent. Nothing could be further from the truth than that the Deputy and Walsh think that the public are very dumb if he expects to believe that Mr. Kyne takes the decisions in his hand to cut the estimates prepared by the Manager. The Deputy and Walsh are those agreeable to the Manager. If he makes one and the Manager's report on the position to the Minister who will in turn direct the Council to adopt the adequate rate or else. The Deputy and Walsh are in the Council still refuses its abolition. So much for the power of the Council members to strike a rate.

But to get back to the money issues. The net rate asked for by the Council is 49. In fact an increase of 3d. over last year, but in fact this 49 is taken into account an amount over the product of 1-10 in the 49 (about 232) for increased valuations on new houses, etc. The town in actual figures the increase sought represented the equivalent of an additional 1-10 in the 49, or about 212, of which 4300 was to go to meet the excess in the demand from the Council.

Now let us turn the Spotlight on this Council. The demand for this year is totalled 218,500 or 2800 more than last year. What is it for? Let me tell you. It is the money which the ratepayers of Dungarvan pay to the County Council as their contribution to the cost of the totals towards Health Services, Public Assistance, and other purposes and mark this well, roads throughout the county. Yes, the ratepayers of Dungarvan have to contribute the equivalent of 5 per cent. of charges for roads all over the county. That is one road charge. There is another, separate to that. It has amounted to 21,200 for a good number of years past and that apparently has been spent on maintaining the ten miles of roads within the urban boundary. There is though, other

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**DROP IDEA APPEAL BY MEMBER IN DUNGARVAN CLINIC DISPUTE**

**Manager Claims Health Authority Resolution Ineffective**

To his mind the resolution passed at the last meeting was not effective in view of the previous resolution passed by the County Council. Mr. S. J. Moynihan, Co. Manager, told this to members of the Waterford Health Authority at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan on Monday when he referred to the resolution passed at their March meeting "that the provision of a Clinic at Priory House, Dungarvan be dropped." After a rather heated discussion the members agreed to adjourn the matter until next meeting and in the meantime to view the premises for themselves.

The matter was raised at Monday's meeting of the Co. Manager who stated that he was absent from the previous meeting because he had to attend a meeting of Kilkenny Co. Council the same day.

The Manager reading from a prepared statement said that at that meeting "that the provision of a Clinic at Priory House, Dungarvan be dropped." I am to inform the Health Authority that when I took over Priory House from the County Council in 1960 in which house the clinic was then in operation, they took over the position exactly as it stood with the Co. Council.

The Manager then, for the information of those members who were not present and who proceeded to give details of the negotiations which led to the purchase of the house by the County Council in 1959. A Committee was appointed by the Council on February 17, 1959, to negotiate the purchase of the premises he said and recommended the purchase of the house for 23,750. At this point Mr. T. Lannen interjected: "You should be ashamed of yourself to be talking about Priory House."

The Manager resumed the reading of his report and said that the purchase of the premises as a suitability were made by Dr. M. O'Farrell, Co. Surgeon, the late Mr. David Sheehy, Mr. Moynihan then told the meeting that he was not aware of the purchase of the house when it was made. He said that he had a detailed report on the condition of the house when it was purchased and that it was necessary to carry out repairs which he outlined carried out and it will be necessary to re-decorate the whole building from top to bottom.

The Manager then read two letters received in January and February, 1959, from the Department of Health on the matter of the purchase of the house. He said that these reports and correspondence it is to my mind grossly unfair to pretend to say that according to a Dungarvan paper report, by a member of the Council, that this was only an old shack. I don't believe that such a statement about Priory House and his reports on the premises bear this out.

**LETTERS TO THE EDITOR**

**DUNGARVAN RATES**

Dear Sir—On your issue of 22nd April you carried an article on the Dungarvan rates. I was interested to read your article in your issue of 22nd April, in fact a typical article reading "Leading Article." With your permission, Mr. Editor, I will take this article paragraph by paragraph and point out the facts as they are, and not as Penman has inaccurately presented them.

(1)—He states "this does not mean that the Gross Expenditure has gone up by only 2244. It has in fact gone up by almost 21,000." Now, what he did not point out was that practically the entire increase is due to the increased County Council demand—a sum of 2800—representing an increase of 1/10 in the rates. The Urban Council and its provision is obligatory on them. A fact which is well known to Penman. So I wonder why did he hide it from the public?

(2)—This states "what should of course have happened is that the old rate of 48/4d. should have been reduced by 1/10, had not the officials blocked every move to do so. This assertion is too ridiculous for words, as it is obvious to anyone that it is just "playing to the gallery." I could just as easily suggest that we reduce it by 2/7. It would look lovely in print, but that is all the use it would be, as it would not secure a reduction of even one farthing in the rates.

(3)—This paragraph deals with the pumping charges for the new water scheme, and provides a typical example of trying to throw dust in the eyes of the public. The question of whether a water scheme supplied from bore holes is the most costly form of water supply or not, does not arise at this stage, as that scheme has already been implemented. The immediate question is the amount of the E.S.B. bill. Now, the people of Dungarvan are familiar with the two contrary sides and while he gathered that all were agreed to pay a rate of 49, the opinion prevailing seemed to be that the members of the Health Authority certainly are not forward in the reason for the purchase of the premises. He also slanders the respected members of the Committee who recommended the purchase and the purchase of the house and its adaptation as a clinic and dispensary.

**PAID LOAN CHARGES**

Referring to loan charges paid and the obligation of the Health Authority in the matter of the payment of the loan charges arising out of the provision of this Clinic and the Health Authority funds have been duly credited. The Health Authority has each year since it commenced made provision for a similar 2200 in respect of these Loan charges so that since the passing of the County Council resolution on 28th March, 1955, 22,700 has been provided in respect of Loan charges for this Clinic.

Section 18 of the Health Act 1953 lays down that a Health Authority shall in accordance with regulations make available without charge at Clinics, Health Centres, or similar Institutions, Medical, Surgical and Nursing Services for children under the age of 16 years.

No such clinics have yet been held in Dungarvan and there is a statutory obligation to provide them in each town of 3,000

Finally it was agreed that the members of the Authority inspect Priory House after the meeting and that discussion of the matter be resumed at next meeting.
