OLD FRIENDS, OLD FADES

A record attendance was one of the big features of last night's very successful Eleventh Annual Meeting and Reunion of the Past Pupils of St. Augustine's College, in Dungarvan. Despite the heavy rain which fell during the evening, the weather cleared up sufficiently to allow the football match between Past and Present Pupils to get under way at a quarter of eight. The match proved to be a close and exciting one, with the final score 1-2 to the Past Pupils. The Annual General Meeting followed at the Priory Hall (a full report of which appears elsewhere in this issue) and the healthy state of the Union was reflected in the interest taken on all subjects down for discussion.

After the meeting there was a short break, during which photographers—professional and amateur got into action—to ensure pictorial records for the future.

Then came the main social activity of the evening, the annual dinner which was held this year at the Devonshire Arms Hotel. Presiding was the former President, Mr. Seamus O'Connell, M.A., a member of the teaching staff at St. Augustine's College, and who is now almost better known in Dungarvan where he resides with his wife, the former Miss Eileen Noble, than he is in his native Sea-Phobol.

The post-prandial speeches were as excellent as the fare which preceded them but it was evident that the memory of one of the founders of the Union who had gone to his eternal rest just a few months previous was very strong and very much in the minds of all those present. But then all will agree that the late Professor Michael O'Hara was more than a founder member of the Union as his influence went back much further—back over the 38 years during which he taught English in the school, and his influence was also a small but very real one in the minds of those who followed and the pleasure they derived from meeting and talking to colleagues who were boys when they were boys.

P.P.U. President Deplores Attitude Towards Education

Group Effort Ousting Small Man In Modern World

Mr. M. J. Barry, a Villierstown man, now living in Dublin and deputy Secretary, Department of Agriculture, in his Presidential Address to the 11th Annual General Meeting of the Past Pupils Union of St. Augustine's College at Dungarvan on Sunday deplored the general attitude in this country towards education. He made an appeal to parents especially to concern themselves more with the problem as he felt the solution would have to begin with them.

Since their last Annual Meeting, said Mr. Barry, who was according to rule, retiring as President of the Union, the possibility of Ireland becoming part of the European Community has been a topic of conversation and discussion, and it is to be expected that this year's meeting will be dominated by the subject. He said that in a period when the concepts of internationalism, nationalism, social organisation and trading practices are being brought down to earth by the fact that Europe is now virtually divided into two groups, Catholic and Protestant, and that the basic reasons extend far beyond trade and the prospects for the future, it is to be hoped that the two groups will gradually merge their interests and come closer together. He said that as we do on the edge of the Continent, these movements have the greatest significance for us and not merely in terms of trade but in every aspect of our lives. We cannot pretend to be neutral, he said, as we are not part of Europe or that we can cut ourselves out of the world. And if we cannot expect to be neutral, he said, we must be prepared to be influenced by the movement of ideas, we have an obligation to be informed of the significance of what is happening and prepare ourselves adequately with new situations.

"One of our greatest problems," he said, "is the fact that it is not merely physical things such as buildings and factories which are being modernised, but mental attitudes may also need to be changed and people may need to be freed of old habits and prejudices. The old ways of thought that have been handed down to us are often better off than we are. Organisations spring up, flourish and gradually die. Groups split up and gradually lose their initial impetus and die. Groups may come together to work for a specific objective but as often as not they are unable to do so. What we have not yet grasped fully in this country is that this is the age of the 'organisation man'. The sturdy individualism which characterised the small farmer or the small businessman to stand on his own feet, has been replaced by a more sentimentalism about it, no longer a matter for the individual but for the group. Just as countries find it necessary to get together so big business and the small businessman or farmer to become more closely associated and so too must the group effort or another. It is not strength in one form or another that counts, it is the ability to work together. In the past thirty years there has been more technological change in the world than in the previous three hundred. In a thousand and one ways mechanical processes have superseded manual effort; this affects the farmer on the remote hillside as well as the factory floor worker who sees the work of ten or even a hundred men being accomplished by a mechanical device. We don't know what the future holds but we can be certain of one thing, it will bring greater changes in technology and scientific application and just like the effect of nuclear weapons in another sense, we can none of us insulate ourselves from the effects on us and on our country of what is going on elsewhere."

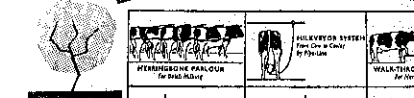

URBAN COUNCIL TO SEEK CONFERENCE WITH MINISTER ON HOUSING PROBLEMS

Approval For More Houses At Boreenatra Refused

Following a special meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council held on last Friday night and at which representatives of the Architect for the Boreenatra Housing Scheme attended, it was decided to seek a conference with the Minister for Local Government and officials of the Department this week to discuss the Department's attitude towards proposals of the Council for the erection of further houses at Boreenatra and Ball Alley site at Clonecty.

Mr. T. A. Ryan, T.D., Chairman, said that he had called the special meeting because the Department had turned down their request to approve the inclusion of an additional six bungalow type houses at the Boreenatra site on the grounds that the site was too small and that they would have to be located near the other houses being built there.

Mr. B. Johnson of the firm of Architects, Messrs. J. Thompson, Limerick, who designed the Boreenatra scheme, said that a number of the foundations had already been laid down. He agreed that the site was narrow but said the Department might be prepared to sanction the Council's proposals if the Out-houses were sited around the main house.

The Chairman said that they should get an immediate decision on the matter. Mr. R. Walsh said that he would not agree at all with the Department's view that there was no room at the Boreenatra site for the 6 bungalows, and Mr. P. Whelan, disagreed also with their suggestion regarding the ball alley site.

Mr. B. White, Acting Town Clerk remarked "they have been coming down already about 10 years."

Mr. Ryan said that he would be prepared to ask the Minister to come down to see the sites for himself and show him that the site at the Ball Alley was not being used even as a playground.

When a member suggested that the Council should take steps to get rid of the Ball Alley, Mr. White said that when a similar problem arose in Clonecty the Corporation there succeeded in selling the alley to a man who put a roof on it and turned it into a garage.

Finally it was decided to seek a conference with the Department at which the Architect, Town Clerk and Chairman would attend.
