PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight

THE INTEGRITY OF THE PRESS

An article which appeared in the issue of May 11, of the "Irish Farmers' Journal" came under fire at the adjourned meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan on Friday last. The article which referred to the visit of a deputation to Dublin was stated by the Chairman, Mr. Charles Curran, to be a gross libel on the members of the Council and a reflection on the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Finance and officials of the Department of Local Government.

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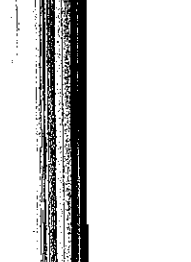

Council was taking a calculated risk. Mr. M. Galley asked: "Is it worth it?"
"The County Manager replied: "It is."
Mr. M. Harty was told that it was not proposed to include the Health Authority in the survey, and Mr. M. Walsh said that 10% of the total County rate went to the Health Authority and if this was not included in the survey it would be omitting a service which was costing most on the rate.
