Behind the Spotlight

RENT WAR ENDS
I was pleased to learn last
week-end that the trouble over
the results of the Caseyville
houses in Dungarvan had come
to an end and that the tenants
had agreed to the proposals of
the County Manager.
Now that matters have been
amicably settled it is easy to
understand the initial reaction
of the tenants. No one likes in-
creases and it was only natural
that a protest be made. How-
ever there was no point in ex-
ceeding the bounds of common-
sense or attempting to advise
people to act contrary to the law
as in the long run it would be
the tenants themselves who
would suffer.
The majority of the tenants
did not, I think, want to cause
trouble and once they were
assured of a sympathetic hear-
ing on any occasions of hard-
ship they were satisfied.
I believe the County Manager
acted very fairly in what he had
to do. It must be remembered
that the Manager has a great
responsibility and does not do
these kind of things merely to
cause trouble. The Urban Coun-
cil members, too, and particu-
larly the Chairman, Mr. J. J.
Kane, T.D., were untiring in
their efforts to bring about a
settlement and to get the best
possible terms for the tenants
but were shown little consid-
eration or given much co-opera-
tion by the members of the
protest committee.
However matters are now
settled up and it is a good thing
that common-sense prevailed
before anyone had to suffer.

A GRIB CUSTOM
The Christmas Grib has dis-
appeared from nearly all
chairs and the near approach

A couple of weeks ago I visited
the Parish of St. John's in
Dungarvan and was surprised
to find that it was practically
stripped of the straw which
provides the cushion for the
mattress. I was told that the
mattress was removed and
the straw was used as a safe-
guard against fire. The custom
apparently is a very old one and
belief that any house which has
a piece of the blessed straw from
the crib will be safe from fire
for the following year is very
strongly held.
The person with whom I
discussed the custom told me
that in country areas the crib
straw is placed in cow-byes as
outhouses also as a safeguard.
I felt rather ashamed at hav-
ing to admit that I had never
heard of this custom before and
wonder if it is peculiar to the
Dungarvan area or whether it
flourishes anywhere else.

CASEYVILLE "RENT WAR" ENDS
Tenants Accept Manager's Proposals
A phone call shortly before midnight on Friday night last informed the Dungarvan Town Clerk, Mr. P. Doyle, at his residence in Ballincourt that the tenants of Caseyville who had been up in arms over a revision of their rents by County Manager, Mr. S. J. Moynihan, had capitulated and agreed to accept proposals put forward by the Manager. The phone call was made by Rent Collector, Mr. Michael Flynn, who had been informed of the tenants' decision by members of the Rent Protest Committee.
It will be recalled that a mass protest march on the Town Hall by the tenants carrying placards with slogans such as "Caseyville Wants Fair Play," "Victims of the Rent War," and "If You Like" took place on Friday, January 10, but a deputation from the tenants led by Mr. Michael Moynihan refused to place any proposals before a special meeting of the Urban Council called in an effort to settle the matter. The deputation at that stage refused to negotiate with anyone but the Co. Manager and stated that the rent war would be dealt with rather than pay the increases.
The following day a deputation from the Urban Council met the Manager but the latter refused, however, to offer any proposals. He was, however, informed by him through the Chairman of the Urban Council that he was prepared to enforce only 50 per cent. of the increases proposed for the year ending 31st March, after that he assumed the deputation also that all the arrears would be dealt with by him in a sympathetic way.

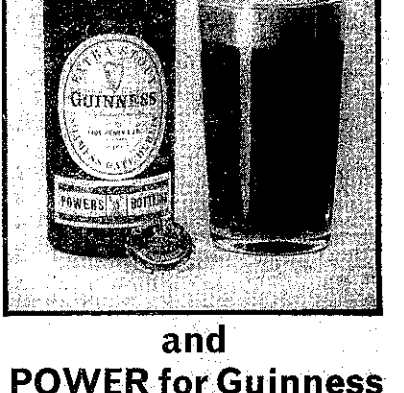
HEALTH AUTHORITY ESTIMATE ADOPTED
Move To Deficit Again Defeated
The Estimate of Expenses for the Waterford Health Authority, which was provisionally adopted three weeks ago was finally approved at the monthly meeting of the Health Authority in Dungarvan on Monday last. It will increase the County rates by 1s in the 6d.
For the third time at Monday's meeting a move by Mr. Norman Walsh to bring the income back to 8d. in the 6d. by deferring payment of a deficit of £24,000 was defeated. The resolution was originally defeated at the first estimate meeting of the Authority and due to the working of standing orders was defeated without ever going to the members at last week's meeting of the County Council.
Mr. Curran said that no recommendation on the estimate had been made by the County Council because of a deadlock which had occurred. He felt, however, that had Mr. Walsh's resolution gone to the meeting it would have been carried.
I can state officially now, said Mr. Curran, that the county will be faced with a very steep rate this year and representatives of the agricultural ratepayers with whom I discussed the matter during the week agreed that it would be better to meet the situation by deferring payment of the debt balance. This is not a recurring item and as the finances of the County Council were never so good I see no reason why we should not meet the situation by deferring the payment of the debt balance. Mr. N. Walsh said that the idea was originally his and although he agreed it might be unorthodox he suggested it because he could see that the county rate was going to be well over 6d. in the 6d. this year. He did not think that the economy of the county could stand up to the ninth round of wage increases which was going to materially affect the rates to a great extent.
