PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight

A TIDY TOWN Dunganarvan has been entered in this year's Tidy Towns Competition but what hope have we of getting anywhere near the top with so many derelict sites and eyegores around the town and while people are so uncomplainingly as to sweep papers and rubbish of all kinds out on to the streets at times when the refuse collectors have already passed.

I know that a new scavenging truck has been ordered and is due for delivery sometime late in April, but it cannot come soon enough as the service provided in this regard by the Urban Council up to this has been none too satisfactory. In stating this I do not want it to be taken that I am finding fault with the men actually engaged in the scavenging service. It is not the men but the system and the supervision I fault.

One horse and cart cannot be expected to service a town the size of Dunganarvan and keep it clean. The cart, an open vehicle, is filled to capacity after receiving a small area and from then on it is overflowing and a large amount of what is being collected is strewn along the streets as the cart passes by while loose papers fly in all directions when blown by the wind.

The latter problem, however, should be solved when the new scavenging trucks commence operations, but the town will never be properly clean until the streets are swept and co-operate 100 per cent. in putting out refuse only at times of such a nature as to sweep papers, cartons and other refuse on the streets at any other time.

It is in this done it should make a big difference to the appearance of the town and will help to clean up the streets and the actual winning of prizes in the competition.

Another aspect of the Tidy Towns Competition was suggested to me in a recent discussion by the Urban Council on the menace presented by the big number of itinerants who seem to find Dunganarvan and its environs a happy camping ground at all times or the year.

One Councillor was perfectly correct when he stated that Dunganarvan was actually swarmed out by itinerants at the moment. All you have to do is to walk around the outskirts of the town and you will soon be convinced of the veracity of this statement.

I have always thought of these people as tinkers, and of course that goes back to the days when the tinker carried on his trade as a tinsmith. But now this has practically died out and the tinker now concerns himself mainly with sweepings and horse manure and the women folk "do the rounds" of the town.

It is not difficult to know where tinkers have camped. You will know it immediately you see days before. You will find old rags, straw, bits of scrap metal and dirt of every description strewn around. In general they pulled up a place in a dreadful mess. A number of them lie up on the Causeway at Abbeyside on Tuesday and for the next couple of hours they were there they let their mark on the place. With people of the kind on the loose in a locality how can any town be kept tidy.

I know that they are entitled to fair treatment and I would be the first to their defence if they were unjustly handled but they cannot act as a law unto themselves and move through the towns and countryside leaving everywhere in a mess after them.

No doubt the problem is a national one and it would be a

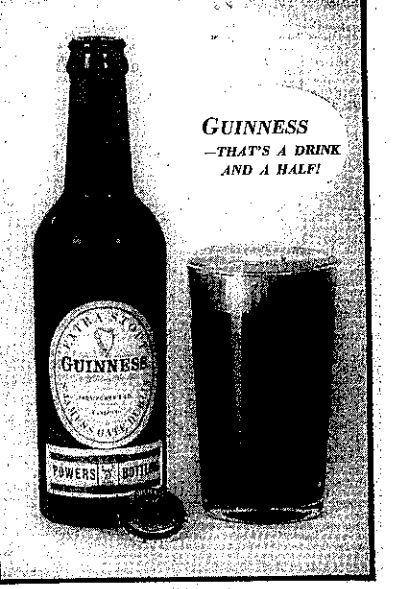

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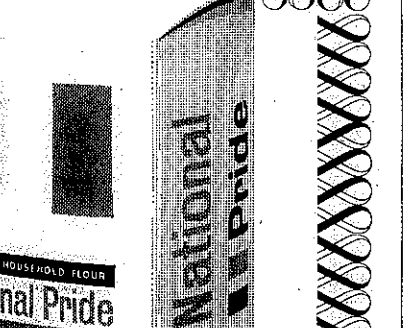

Skinner at Dungarvan District Court on Wednesday adjudged for one month's imprisonment in which Mr. Wenden House, The Coole, Inchindrisia, Dungarvan, summoned Mrs. Annie Boland, Inchindrisia, for using threatening and abusive language towards her at Inchindrisia, on January 7 last.

Deputy Kyns Supports Motion to Increase Disablement Benefits. Speaking on the motion in An Daill on Wednesday, February 11th, Deputy Kyns said: "I support this motion as I support any motion which aims at improving the lot of the poor. I agree with Deputy Loughran not only do these disabled people need sufficient to enable them to live but they need others of their families to enable the whole or part of their physical needs as well. The disabled have as good a claim to draw on State funds as have those who draw the non-contributory Old Age Pension for their financial support. Old age pensioners and blind pensioners do not contribute to wards, their pensions but still they get a lot more by way of State help than the disabled person. All of us must agree that the most in need should have first call on whatever funds are available. I do not agree with Deputy Burke, however, that this motion can be remedied at Budget time only. We had for example today an announcement by the Government that they were giving 12 per cent. to the Civil Service. I quite agree that Civil Servants are entitled to this increase, but surely if some 24 million can be found to meet this sum of less than a quarter of a million pounds can be found without waiting for the Budget to say an increase to the disabled poor."
