A FACTORY AND A HOSPITAL
When members of Dungarvan
Urban Council meet on tomor-
row (Friday) night for their
monthly meeting (incidentally it
will also be the annual meeting
at which the Chairman and
Vice-Chairman will be elected)
they will consider among other
things the preliminary formal-
ities for the transfer of five
acres of land which the Council
owns to the Arrow Manu-
facturing Company of Denver,
Colorado, U.S.A., that is of course
contiguous to the fact that the
Company will set up a new in-
dustry in the town.
These five acres were originally
purchased by the then Water-
ford Board of Assistance
many years ago as the site for a
new hospital in Dungarvan and
are located across the road from
the present District Hospital at
the outskirts of the town. When
the idea of a new hospital for
the town was scrapped the site
remained idle and on the estab-
lishment of the Waterford
Health Authority, it with all the
other property of the Board of
Assistance, was transferred to
Subsequently the Urban Council
applied to the Health Authority
to sell them the site for the pur-
pose of building houses and fol-
lowing negotiations it was duly
transferred. This is the history
of the site.

Now we are all pleased by the
possibility of a new industry
coming to the town. It will
mean greater prosperity for the
district, provide for employ-
ment, and for a variety of
other reasons will be wel-
come. The Dower Company is,
I understand, engaged in the
manufacture of heavy machin-

BACKWARD

When considering Depart-
