FOOD IN HOSPITALS There has been a lot of talk about the quality and quantity of food served to patients in hospitals and especially at Ardkeen Hospital, Waterford, in recent months. Allegations have been made that improperly cleaned fish had been given to at least one patient while a complaint by the Tallow Correspondent of the Leader in last week's Tallow Notes stated that the quantity of food given to some patients was less than a hen would eat.

The matter of the fish was fully discussed at last Monday's meeting of the Health Authority, the body controlling all hospitals and health institutions in the county and city. In essence, the result of the discussion was an admission by the hospital authorities that it was possible that the patient mistook a herring roe for a gut, but that in view of the manner in which the complaint was lodged, it would never be possible to establish whether the complaint was justified or not.

Personally, I believe that the Hospital Authorities met the case very fairly and the M.S. was most candid in all his admissions. It was evident that there was nothing to hide and that the incident which gave rise to the complaint if it did occur, was a most trivial one when the overall picture of the amount of food which has to be prepared throughout the year for the thousands of patients is taken into consideration. The complaint was given an importance far beyond its merits and the publicity it received, especially in the English newspapers, gave a totally wrong impression.

At the same time, I suppose it does no harm to have complaints aired now and again as this helps to keep people on their toes. In regard to the quantity of food served to patients at Ardkeen, I think there can be very little grounds for complaint at all in this regard. The Tallow Correspondent of the Leader, however, placed the blame on the hospital staff for this "cheeseparing" as he calls it, but rather than the staff, I would rather say that the blame should be placed on the members of the Health Authority who are constantly referring to the ever-increasing burdens of the Health Act as regularly made by a number of members of the Health Authority who are completely justified in doing so, since the cost of the Health Services in the county is the greatest single expenditure on the rates. Now, the objections against the fact that the Health Authority have not such a high percentage of the cost of the Health Services as they should be, is a national charge since it is a charge which is excluded by the Department of Health in Dublin.

I have been attending meetings of the Health Bodies in this county for years, and I never yet have heard any one, not even the members of the Health Authority, make any attempt to increase the expenditure on the Health Services in the county. The election of a new Chairman for the Waterford Health Authority at its monthly meeting in Dungarvan on Monday last was the occasion of some heated cross-fire between representatives from the county and the city. The election was decided by a narrow margin, the death of Aid W. Kennedy, who had been Chairman for 15 years.

Mr. James Power (Ind.) Waterford Corporation was first on his feet to propose Mr. P. Browne (P.F.) Mayor of Waterford, to fill the vacancy. The proposal was seconded by another Independent member of the Corporation, Mr. E. Brown. Mr. W. R. Curran then proposed that the existing Vice-Chairman, Mr. N. Walsh (F.O.), be elected to the Chair.
