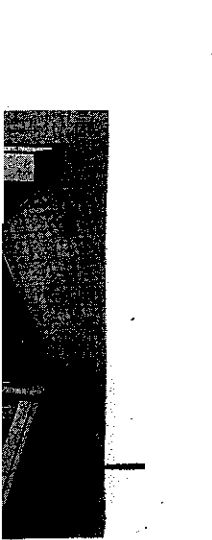

PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight

GALA WEEK 1965
I understand that the Committee of the very successful Dunganvan Gala Week have fixed June 27-July 4 as the date for next year's festival.

It would be like gliding the great work out into next year's festival by the Committee but I am sure that their efforts will be successful in the actual planning of the Gala Week and the financial commitments they are so willingly undertaking. The result was that the traders of Dunganvan had a big boost in their turn-over and the town earned an excellent name for itself.

In the week after the July Gala everywhere I went heard of the town. They were admiring and praising from the shopkeepers, business people, hoteliers and traders generally of the town. They were adamant that the Gala Week must become an annual event in the social life of Dunganvan and to the Committee in charge have arranged.

A general meeting was called by the Gala Week Committee last Friday night to discuss plans for next year and of more immediate importance the benefits of a comprehensive Christmas shopping period. It looked though.

Immediately after the July Gala had closed the meeting to discuss the next year's plans for the town and any outstanding items concerning next year's Gala Week on a practical footing.

DAIL QUESTIONS

VILLIERSTOWN SCHOOL WITHOUT A WATER SUPPLY
Mr. S. Treacy (Lab.) asked the Minister for Local Government if he was aware that at present the new school erected at Villierstown, was without a water supply, and if he would take immediate steps to end the present delay in the provision of a water supply in Villierstown.

Mr. Blaney said he was aware that the new school at Villierstown cannot be supplied from the existing water supply which was inadequate. He had already given approval to the County Engineer for a water supply improvement scheme which he understood would be put to tender shortly.

MODELIGO WATER SUPPLY
Mr. Treacy also asked the Minister what was the approximate position with regard to the provision of a piped water supply at Modeligo.

Mr. Blaney said he understood that a preliminary report on the scheme had been received by Waterford County Council from their Consulting Engineer and was being examined by them.

DROMANA BRIDGE
Mr. Treacy (Lab.) asked the Minister for Lands if he would have the Dromana Bridge, Villierstown, which was to be erected by the Department, surveyed to ascertain the probable cost of putting it into repair and restoring it for use of the people of Villierstown.

Mr. O. Boyle, Parliamentary Secretary, said he had no function in relation to the repair of the bridge. It was included in the property acquired by the Department.

CO. COUNCIL AGREE IN PRINCIPLE TO WATER SUPPLY SCHEME FOR MODELIGO

Waterford County Council has agreed in principle to a new Water Supply Scheme for Modeligo at an estimated cost of £282,000, which would take six years to complete. But at last Monday's meeting of the County Council, at which this decision was taken, the people of the County were pleased by the Chairman, Mr. E. Curran, for an apparent lack of effort to provide their own private supplies.

Before the proposed Modeligo scheme was discussed, Mr. Curran said that a tremendous demand for public water schemes in the County, which was significant that the people of County Waterford had made an apparent effort to provide their own private supplies. Even recently the Minister, speaking at a dinner arranged in Waterford in the matter of Public Supplies and Group Schemes.

"The public will have to realise," said Mr. Curran, "that if these schemes are to be implemented, they will have to pay for them and that there will be a considerable increase in the rates." He added that the Modeligo Water Scheme was in effect a public scheme and would be a very expensive one.

DESPERATE PLIGHT
Mr. S. Whelan said the people in the Modeligo area were in a desperate plight for water, and he could not adequately stress the importance of water to them. They really needed it badly.

Mr. R. Walsh said he appreciated the fact that the people needed water but that the cost of a house and the cost of the water supply scheme in the area was not economical. It was about time the people realised that the water scheme cost and if they were then prepared to pay for their water supply.

Mr. G. Galgey said this water supply scheme was a fantastic figure but what water was a County water supply scheme for the County were entitled to water. Why should one section have the right to water and another not?

Mr. H. O'Connell said that the County Engineer, Mr. J. D. Blaney, had said that a demand for water for agricultural purposes at the Modeligo area had been a false figure.

Mr. H. O'Connell said he believed £540 per house was a false figure. He should consider fully what the water scheme in the area had private supplies and also that some people would agree in principle to a water supply scheme.

Mr. H. O'Connell said that he had no doubt that the number of people in the area had increased since 1950. He had a duty as a public body in providing water for the people. He proposed they adopt this Modeligo scheme. He was not mixing up the water supply with any other County Council, but he believed this scheme was an absolute necessity.

Mr. T. A. Kynne, T.D., seconded Mr. H. O'Connell's proposal. He said the scheme would have to be broken down into units. He was thinking of carrying it out on a six years basis. There were 54 houses in the area representing about 2,500 people.

Mr. N. Walsh said he thought it was vitally important to get an up-to-date survey on the demands for water in the area before they start the scheme. That would be a good business proposition.

Mr. H. R. Dowd said he believed it would be very much better to first of all have an up-to-date survey of the area carried out and then let the Council decide yes or no for the scheme. They should forget the "agree in principle" business.

Mr. K. O'Riordan proposed, and Mr. N. Walsh seconded, that they defer the matter until an up-to-date survey on the demand for water in the area was carried out.

That proposal was then put to the meeting and defeated by 16 votes to 6. The voting was: For—Messrs. Dowd, Hurley, O'Riordan, Walsh, Madden, 16; Against—Messrs. Butler, Kynne, Whelan, Doonan, Fahy, Moran, Galgey, Morrissey, R. Walsh, Curran, 6.

DECISION ON CO. ENGINEER'S REPORT DEFERRED

Mr. Whelan's proposal to adopt the scheme was then put and carried on a 12-4 vote. The following voted for the scheme: Messrs. Butler, Curran, Dowd, Hurley, Kynne, Whelan, Doonan, Fahy, Moran, Galgey, Morrissey, R. Walsh, O'Riordan, 12. Against—Messrs. O'Riordan, Dowd, N. Walsh and Madden, 4.

WILL COST ADDITIONAL EXPENSE ON RATES IF ADOPTED

A decision regarding the implementation of the Local Government (Planning and Development) Act, 1963, and the establishment of a new planning section to the County Council was deferred again at the Council's special meeting in Dunganvan on Monday last. If the report of the County Engineer, Mr. J. D. Blaney, on this matter is adopted, seven additional posts will have to be created and its impact on the rates will be an additional six pence.

The proposal which was deferred was: That we adopt the County Engineer's report regarding the implementation of the Local Government (Planning and Development) Act, 1963, and that we approve of the establishment of a planning section and the creation of the following posts therefore: One Planner with the rank of Chief Assistant County Engineer, one Draughtsman, one Building Inspector, one Staff Officer, one Clerical Officer, and one Clerk Typist.

Mr. M. Galgey, said if they had their own men to do the necessary planning work for all projects and schemes in the County it would be much more economical than the present situation. Authorities were getting a free of 5d. in every £, and they were not interested in getting as much as they could out of every job. They had a planning committee on the whole which for Dunganvan Water Scheme and he would say that about £5000 to £6000 was being spent on it.
