CENTRAL LAUNDRY SYSTEM FOR ALL HOSPITALS

Proposal Adjourned For Detailed Costings

The suggestion that an improved laundry be established at Ardskeen to deal with the laundry from all the hospitals in the county was again discussed at last Monday's meeting of the Waterford Health Authority in Dungarvan.

Mr. J. Lannen said he was opposed to the proposal. There was a laundry attached to the Co. Home and District Hospital in Dungarvan and he did not think it would be practical to send the clothes up and down to Waterford as they could get damp in transit. He proposed that the laundry in Dungarvan be allowed to continue as at present.

Mr. W. Dwyer seconded.

Mr. J. Hynes, Secretary, said that the cost of running the laundry at Ardskeen at present was £18,000 a year and to extend it to cope with the wash from all other hospitals would cost £60,000. As the cost of providing new equipment at the laundries at St. Otteran, Dungarvan and Dunmore would be £20,000, it would mean a saving of £13,000 if an improved laundry was set up at Ardskeen.

Mr. Lannen said that it might be alright putting things on paper like that, but in practice it was a different thing. He did not think the plan to centralise the laundry was a practical one and they had a nice little plant in Dungarvan.

The Secretary, Mr. J. A. Hynes, told members of Waterford Health Authority that so far he had received no word from the Department to discuss the matter of repairs required to the walls of the Dints at Ardskeen. He had, however, been informed that a letter concerning the matter was in the post.

When a point was raised as to reducing the personnel of the deputation Mr. J. Griffin said that the original number should be left stand. "Because of the nature of the business to be discussed," said Mr. Griffin, "it is better to have a representative body going up to say to the Minister 'we have been sold a pup and we want you to take it back'."

It was agreed to make no change.

SAYS H.A. MEMBER

Commenting on the Auditor's Report on the Accounts of the Waterford Health Authority for the year ended March 31, 1963, at a meeting of the Authority in Dungarvan last Monday, Mr. Dwyer said that while he wished to compliment the officials on the excellence of the report he thought the high spending was worrying.

Mr. T. Lannen said that the administrative costs all over the county were too high. "There's no respect for public money at all and it's a case of voting away high increases over time they come up here," he said.

Mr. M. Gaihey said that it would have cost £50,000 to engage a firm of industrial Consultants a couple of years ago. He thought it would have been £10,000 if they had been done. He said that the cost of running Ardskeen by one-third as the Minister's officials are overlapping there, he said.

Mr. Lannen said that while he did not want people working for nothing he did not want people to be getting too much. "The cost of wages for the Mental Hospital was £150,000 a year at one time and now it's £100,000 or so some years ago."

Mr. J. Hynes said that the cost was now around £150,000 a year and he thought it was a good deal better than it was some years ago.

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PROPOSED EXTENSION OF WATERMAIN

WINKING WILLIE FOR ARDKEEN ENTRANCE?

Because members of the Waterford Health Authority considered the entrance to Ardskeen Hospital a danger to vehicular traffic they decided at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday to re-consider the entrance to the hospital. A "Winking Willie" is erected there to warn motorists of the danger.

A report from the Co. Engineer stated that the only practical solution to the problem was to take down the wall on the Dunmore side of the entrance to a lower level and re-site it on a new line. The cost of doing this would be £750. To lower the level of the wall on the Waterford side which would make the entrance safer would cost an additional £200. The report added that the erection of a "Winking Willie" would not be of any great advantage.

Mr. N. Walsh said that the danger at the entrance came from the Dunmore side but he thought the estimate for knocking the wall on that side down was too high. He said that this work should be done, he said, "I disagree with the estimate."

Mr. P. Browne, Mayor (Chairman)—It seems terribly high, but I suppose our hands are tied as far as that part of it is concerned.

Mr. E. Collins was told that no serious accidents had occurred at the entrance.

Mr. D. Madden—I have gone in and out there many times and I find no trouble going in but coming out. I have to stop and take precautions. It is no more dangerous than several other places.

Mr. M. Gaihey said that he had spoken to two or three drivers and garage owners about the entrance and the most of them said that if it was spaced about 100 yds. it would only make it a speedway and someone would then be surely killed there.

Mr. P. Cahill who first raised the matter, said that if some of the members, however, what they struck there would be less accidents. Some of them were breaking the law for speeding along that road. He then proposed that a "Winking Willie" be erected there more than 100 yds. he said, "This would solve the problem."

Mr. E. Collins seconded the proposal.

Mr. D. Foran said that if anyone coming out the entrance exercised responsible care there would be no danger.

Mr. T. Lannen said that they should defer a decision on the matter until the estimates meeting.

By 13 votes to 5, Mr. Cahill's resolution was approved.

APPROVAL FOR CHANGE OVER AT CARPOQUIN ORPHANAGE GRANTED

A notice of motion moved by Mr. N. Walsh at last Monday's meeting of the Waterford Health Authority that the Minister for Health be requested to approve the application of St. Michael's School, Carpoquin, under the control of the Sisters of Mercy for the purpose of the Health Act, for the education and treatment of mildly and high moderately handicapped children in a 6-day residential day-school was unanimously approved.

Mr. Walsh moving the motion said that the history of St. Michael's was known to everybody. For close on 100 years they were associated with the care of orphan boys up to 10 years. Under the new system orphans were now more often sent to foster parents, and the Sisters decided on this new venture which would enable them to care for mentally retarded children from West Waterford, East Cork and South Tipperary. He asked all the members to support the motion.

Mr. J. Fahy seconded stating that this was a matter for which they should do all they could.

The motion was then passed unanimously.
