CHRISTMAS CARDS AND POSTAGE

MISGIVINGS AT GOVERNMENT'S APPROACH TO LANGUAGE PROBLEM

A major obstacle to the formulation of a satisfactory White Paper on Irish is the fact that the responsible drafting body, the civil service, would themselves be more affected by a real policy for restoration than any other institution in the country, said Dr. Seán O Tuama, Director, An Cumhair Fobli, in Dungarvan on Wednesday night December 2. He was speaking at the annual dinner of Cumair Quilich for those in the Devonshire Arms Hotel.

While we were fortunate in possession of a highly efficient civil service, it was still the traditional hallmark of a civil service to be conservative and to resist any radical change, especially in regard to its own administrative procedures, he said. Consequently one of the major signs that the Government was not only being unconvincingly aimed at restoration would be a clear indication to its civil service itself was willing to take at least some gradual and flexible steps within the next few years to ensure that it would in time function more dominantly through Irish.

Armore and Mitchels Finish Level In Phelan Cup Final

Armore 0-5; John Mitchels 0-5. After battling for an hour in the mud at the Phelan field, Dungarvan, on Sunday last, Armore and John Mitchels failed to reach a decision in the final of the 1963 Phelan Cup senior football competition when a handful of spectators saw them finish level 0-5 each in a disappointing game which was played under the worst conditions imaginable. A heavy wind and continuous downpour completely ruled out the possibility of any good football and both sides were literally "bogged down" in the mire like sod long before the final whistle. The heavy underfoot conditions taxed the stamina of both teams to the utmost and going into the last quarter had taken full toll on the players and there was a noticeable slowing down in the game during this period. Armore with the strong wind advantage did most of the pressing in the first half. Maurice Colbert inched their ahead with a point after only one minute and Michael John Joe Carleton (free) added two more before Tommy Kirwan and Mitchels first player from free in the sixteenth minute. During this half the Armore forwards were guilty of many inexcusable blunders as time and again they squandered good scoring chances. With an abundant supply of the ball from midfield they had ample opportunities to run up a match winning total but they failed completely in front of goal. On the turn over the Mitchels side with the gate behind them gained the advantage and brought the scores level. They jumped ahead by a point but failed to hold the advantage as Jim Rooney brought the sides level during the closing stages with a point. During this second half the Mitchels forwards lost a considerable amount of scores when they were well in control of the game. ROAD SAFETY

We have received the following letter for publication from Lordship, Most Rev. Dr. Coghlan, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore:

Very Rev. and Rev. Fathers and dear Brethren—As you will know a nation-wide campaign for ROAD SAFETY is being conducted under the auspices of the Minister for Local Government in the fortnight commencing on 4th December. The County Manager, Mr. Theobald J. Moughlin, has invited me that, in co-operation with the Waterford County Council and other Local Authorities in the County, he hopes to have this campaign energetically conducted in County Waterford.

I feel that this renewed effort to draw attention to a realistic way, to the dangers that are inseparable from travel on our roads, especially at this time of the year, is worthy of the whole-hearted co-operation and support of all, Bishop, Priests and people.

It is obvious that those who drive motor cars at all times of the day or night, and indeed all road users, have an obligation in conscience to take the maximum care of their own lives and of the lives of others. It is the right and privilege of each of us to travel on the public highway and to go from place to place with minimum of inconvenience. But, when we move on to the highway we must not forget that, from the very nature of things, there is always real danger of accident that may result in serious injury and even to death.

At this time of the year, because of weather conditions and because people tend to relax more than usual, the dangers are increased. Appeal, therefore, to every person who uses the roads, to take care at all times, lest in an unguarded moment any one of our homes and families be deprived of its breadwinner or that some one be plunged in grief by the untimely death of an innocent child.

I ask the Priests of the Diocese, therefore, to read this appeal from the pulpit on Sunday 6th December, and to invite every member of the Faithful to think well and to act with all due consideration in regard to this serious matter of ROAD SAFETY.

The County Manager has suggested that, on this same Sunday (6th December) Parish Priests arrange for a ceremonial blessing of motor cars and vehicles at each Parish Church. I warmly approve of this suggestion being carried out where ever it is feasible.
