NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

Every year serious losses are sustained by sheep owners—especially at lambing time—as a result of attacks on their flocks by marauding dogs.

You commit an offence and are liable on conviction to a fine of up to £20 for a first offence or up to £50 for a second or subsequent offence.

If you are not present to claim it your dog may be seized and destroyed.

If your dog is shot by a sheep-owner you may have no redress.

You may be sued and be liable for heavy damages.

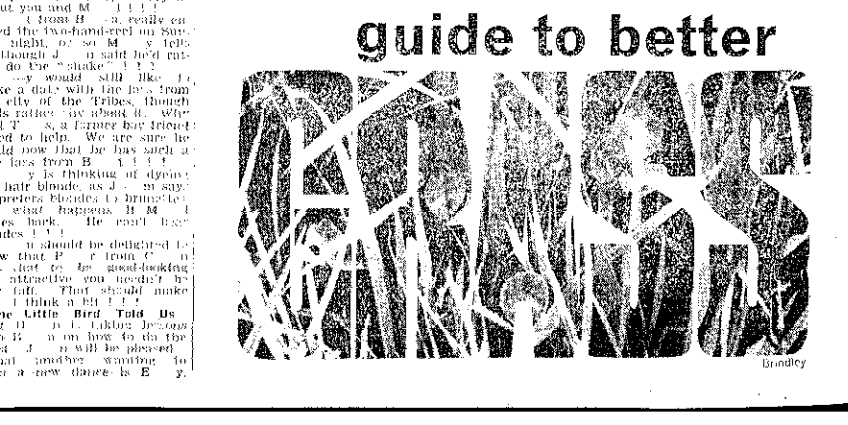

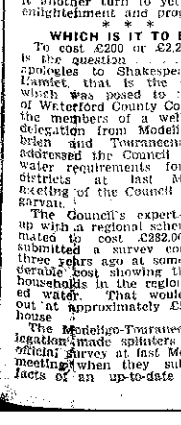
