**LITTER BUGS BEWARE**  
Despite all the complaints made and all the publicity given during the past couple of years to the problem of litter, it does not appear to have improved one bit. If anything it has become worse. The streets of practically every town in West Waterford could be greatly improved from the point of view of cleanliness by a little bit more effort from the local Authority and a great deal more cooperation from the general public.

While I know that the cleaning services could be expected to do more than what they are doing at present, the appeals directed to the residents and public in general to become more litter conscious and to keep the streets and public thoroughfares clean are so far it appears, fallen on deaf ears. An appeal to civic pride therefore seems to have failed, it seems to have proved a success so the time has come for other and tougher measures to make Jack Citizen Litter conscious in spite of himself.

The first thing that the Local Authorities, that is the County and Urban Councils, will have to do is to place litter in suitable places. The public will then have to learn to use these and not to throw cigarette and match boxes, newspapers and other rubbish on the streets. If the public fail or refuse to learn the easy way then they will have to be taught the hard way.

In Cork the City Manager has sought the help of the various Street Organisations, City Schools, Trade Unions and other organisations to point out effective ways to keep the streets clean, but the Corporation which is charged with keeping the streets of the city tidy, have been warning that drastic action will follow if the citizens on the part of the citizens to cooperate.

### REGIONAL WATER SCHEMES WOULD COST FORTUNE AND BREAK COUNTY

County Council Has Change of Heart On Modeligo Scheme

Waterford County Council at a special meeting in Dungarvan last Monday, having reconsidered their previous decision on regional water schemes with special reference to the £2,200,000 scheme planned for Rathgormack, decided to scrap the Modeligo scheme and concentrate more on small group schemes and well boring to meet the water requirements of the rural areas without supplies. The final fate of the other major regional scheme at Rathgormack estimated at £2,200,000, is still in the first stage (to cost £40,000) of which had been already approved by the Council at its last meeting of the Council.

The Council approved in principle the Modeligo scheme at its last meeting of the Council in November but since then this decision has been strongly opposed by the Co. Executive and a number of protest meetings have been held in the Modeligo-Kilbrin area. A delegation of residents from the area came before the Council about two months ago voiced their opposition to the scheme and submitted figures which were completely at variance with those submitted by the County Engineer as to the requirements of water.

In reply to a question by Mr. M. Walsh the Chairman, Mr. G. Curran said that he had the question of the Rathgormack scheme put on the agenda as well as the Modeligo scheme because he had received letters from a number of farmers in the area stating that this scheme was too elaborate also.

Mr. F. J. O'Leary, Acting Secretary told the meeting that the Modeligo scheme would be about £2,200,000, stage one to cost £400,000, stage two to cost £1,800,000. The scheme was approved by the Council at the Department but the start of the scheme had been deferred pending the Council's decision.

Mr. Curran said that while some of the objections to the scheme were valid, he was sure that the wisdom of the scheme was not in doubt. ### RIDDLE OF FARMER'S DEATH OCCUPIES INQUEST JURY FOR TWO HOURS

Was He Dead Before Car Fire Occurred?

The resumed inquest on Edward Loneragan (51), farmer and agricultural contractor, married and father of a family of nine of Lucksarran Boreen, was held by Dr. Daniel Healy, Lismore Coroner for West Waterford at the Court House, Dungarvan, on last Friday night. Before it concluded what had happened to the farmer was not clear.

Mr. E. Heskin suggested the inquest should be held in the afternoon at the amount of water used. A charge per 1,000 gallons could be made and this would be a fairer method than the present system of charging for the number of meters installed.

Mr. J. G. Dowling, Acting Manager, said that the average meter system ran from 1 to 2 1/2 per 1,000 gallons. Mr. Curran said that in his opinion all water charges should be increased as the amount collected at present provided only a microscopic portion of the cost of the schemes.

Mr. R. Walsh said that it would cost a fortune to provide water in every house in the County by regional schemes and he believed that it would run into £100 a house of this kind. On top of that there would be heavy maintenance costs which would break the county and the people who had to pay them.

Mr. Curran said that the cost of the regional schemes and other minor ones in the county's original overall water plan was £3 million. The Rathgormack and Modeligo schemes and all the minor ones only came to £2 million.

Mr. J. Fahy, T.D. said that the people of Modeligo had been asked to sign a petition to the Minister for the Environment and the Minister had agreed to fund the scheme. He said that the Minister had agreed to fund the scheme.
