## PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight

BE CAREFUL ON THE ROADS. The first big holiday week-end of the summer is with us and for the next few days thousands of people will be travelling in all directions through the country. Yet, the roads are not so young, heavy-heaving their cars and worries, he themselves off to some enjoyment.

But don't let what starts off as a successful holiday holiday cut up in largely through carelessness. Don't let yourself be involved in an accident which may cause the worst results or at the best less serious injuries.

The success of the previous Road Safety Campaign has prompted the Minister for Local Government, Mr. Neil T. Blaney to initiate another for the summer and it is to be hoped that the appeal going out now will result in a big saving of lives and the protection of many from being seriously injured and maimed in crashed cars.

Don't tempt fate while you are out on the roads. Realise your responsibilities to yourself, to those in your care and also to other users of the road. Drive with care at all times. If you happen to take one over the right, don't try to press your better driver than you are by insisting on getting a better view of the road behind the wheel and probably one winding up in the morgue.

On the other hand if you are one of those slow, steady drivers who do not like speeds beyond 35 or 40, don't hog the middle of the road. Keep to your own side to allow faster traffic travelling at normal speeds to pass by safely. Otherwise you may be the cause of building up a line of frustrated drivers behind you and this is a big contributory cause in the matter of road accidents.

And don't try to pretend that you are a Stanley Woods or a Jim Clark, by taking all sorts of hair-brained risks. Don't drive so close to the car in front as to be almost touching. Don't be too close to the driver's neck, and don't try to corner anyone that you are slower than he is.

So show off your skills on a week-end and enjoy yourself. It's all right to show off, but next week, otherwise well . . .

PLAN FOR THE FUTURE. We had a look into the future at last Friday's meeting of the Planning Committee in Dungarvan. We examined a set of maps drawn up to show possible trends in the town's development for the future.

The rough outline of the plan is dealt with in report of the meeting elsewhere in this issue and I only wish to refer to it in broad terms here. The Plan is the result of the 1962 Local Government Planning and Development Act which was introduced mainly to see that haphazard building was stopped and that planned development took its place. The Act requires Planning Authorities to prepare Development Plans for their areas within a period of three years of its coming into force and in the case of Dungarvan Urban Council, the Department asked that it define its broad planning policy, based on the needs and prospects of the town. This is a very good thing, provided that the idea is not enforced too rigidly. It is not meant to be a strait-jacket, but there should be some order in the way things are planned. Factories and industries should not be allowed in residential areas, nor should local amenities be destroyed by unsightly structures. But there should be provision for flexibility in border-line cases and the best of the doubt should always be given to the individual. Too often in the past we have found that the public has become the victim of hasty enactments over a too rigid interpretation of the laws.

DUNGARVAN HAS DEVELOPMENT PLAN FOR THE FUTURE

The Provisional Development Plan for Dungarvan drawn up in accordance with the local Government Planning and Development Act, 1962, was approved at last Friday night's meeting of the Urban Council.


