DUNGARVAN WILL HAVE NEW INDUSTRY AFTER ALL

The hearing assistance given by Mr. Richard Walsh, Vice-Chairman of Dungarvan Urban Council in letters he wrote last week to the Editors of a big number of papers that Dungarvan is to have a new industry, backed by German interests, has been the source of much satisfaction to the working population of the town. There was it seems some misunderstanding caused by the publication of what Mr. Walsh described as "an obviously incorrect report" in some newspapers some time previously that this industry like the American one before it would be folded up and that the industrial future of the town looked blue.

Mr. Walsh's letter claims that he was responsible for the promotion of the new German industry in Dungarvan and that he had got in touch with the principals when he read that it was to be abandoned. He had informed them that there was no truth in the abandonment report and that the true position was that they would be coming to reside in Dungarvan soon and would then commence business.

After a number of disappointments and false starts on our industrial front, Mr. Walsh's letter then was doubly welcome and was undoubtedly read with great interest by those people who were looking forward to the commencement of operations in the near future.

In the meantime I wonder would Mr. Walsh further allay the curiosity of the people of the town by giving it possible to appreciate the nature of the industry which his German friends are about to start. We appreciate what the employment content is likely to be.

Incidentally, before closing this paragraph, there is only one exception I wish to make in Mr. Walsh's letter. That was the last paragraph which stated: "No doubt you will appreciate that the previous report could have had a very damaging effect on the promotion of this industry."

It is in Dungarvan and reports of this nature should not be made without being based on facts. The report of the abandonment, as the Editor pointed out in this paper, did not remember reading it in other newspapers. There was no such thing as a damaging report in it and perhaps when Mr. Walsh has given us the facts about the nature of the industry and what it is likely to mean to the town economy, we will then be able to deal further with the matter.

We will await Mr. Walsh's reply with interest and leave the matter rest until then.

COUNCILLOR REFERS TO T.D.'S "EXTRAORDINARY STATEMENT"

Mr. W. Dowar at last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan described as extraordinary the statement reportedly made by Mr. Sean Treacy, T.D., in the Ball concerning the Modello Regional water scheme. He said that Mr. Treacy had accused the N.E.A. of having sabotaged the scheme and because they had advised saving money for the ratepayers they were being branded as saboteurs.

"The N.E.A. came here in a very democratic way," said Mr. Dowar, "but they are now branded in this way when they are the ones who are saving money for the ratepayers and for the ratepayers' own good."

Mr. C. Curran, Chairman, said that he agreed with Mr. Dowar. The statement made by Mr. Treacy in the Ball implied that the N.E.A. had sabotaged the Modello water scheme. That was quite wrong as the deputation which had come before the Council had reported that the scheme was not an N.E.A. deputation at all. The principal speakers of that deputation were Mr. Treacy and two Clergymen and a Trade Union Official.
