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PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight

"A GRIMY OLD LUGGER"
 It was wonderful to watch the "Rose" being piloted into Dungarvan Harbour. The simple black and white sailing ship with its grey canvas sails was undoubtedly a grimy old lugger but it was the look out at the harbour mouth, she was a dream of a sailing ship from far away places. I have since learned that she only voyaged between Ireland and Wales but we didn't know this, and always speechless with excitement and awe, we would watch her sail by the main sandbank and into the harbour.

So opens an article with the title "First Love" over the simple byline "S. Burke" in the July issue of "Ashore and Afloat" the monthly journal of the Royal Sailors' Rests. The magazine was sent to me by Tom Morrissey or Mooney and his covering note states: "An old seaman, I got a kick out of this month's copy of our magazine because I am too an old Deedes man."

I have spent the past few weeks since the magazine first came into my hands researching into the contents of the article but although I have been in contact with most people likely to have knowledge of the old "Rose" shipping history, I have been unable to obtain any concrete information. Mr. Burke's article would seem to indicate that the "Rose" was built in London because he writes about one room in their National School with the teaching staff and that in general things were done away but efficiently. If she moved her colleagues seem to have no fear of the law as they are carrying on as brazenly and openly as ever.

During the course of the discussion, Mr. Walsh said that a caretaker in his area was getting £5 a year, but he was doing nothing to the graveyard at all as it was being looked after by another man employed by a voluntary committee.

Mr. Curran said that the family graveyard at Reilig A' tseibhe outside Dungarvan was completely overgrown with brambles.

DROMANA BRIDGE AND ROAD TO BE RE-OPENED

Inhabitants Of Villierstown "Caught In Corner" For Ten Years

A period of "isolation" lasting over the past ten years for the people of Villierstown is likely to come to an end following the re-opening of the road to the Dromana Estate via Dromana Bridge and road to be re-opened.

Mr. N. Walsh said that as a member of the Council he was never too "haboo" when it came to spending the ratepayers' money but he would unhesitatingly give his support to this project. He knew it would involve the Council in substantial expenditure but he felt it would be money well spent.

Mr. Walsh went on to point out how a new bridge and road would open up a locality of great historic importance and a vista of, so far, unspoiled scenic beauty to the people of Villierstown. He said, been living in isolation since the link which had always existed between them and Cappoquin had been cut. It was time to restore that link now.

Mr. Fahy then proposed and Mr. Curran seconded a motion countermanding by Mr. Curran and M. N. Walsh that the road from Villierstown to Dromana Estate via Dromana Bridge and road to be re-opened when the Land Commission acquired the property for the restoration of the bridge and road.

The motion was passed unanimously but the Chairman pointed out that the Council could not take over the road until the Estimates meeting which would be held in a few months time.

Mr. Fahy said he was satisfied that the Council had taken a very definite step in the matter by passing the motion.

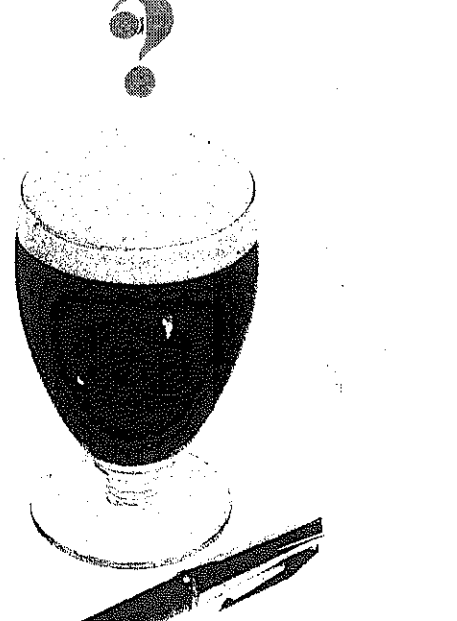
