FORGOTTEN BRAVERY

A little-known plaque on the Leather Factory Wall at the Look-Out, Dungarvan, was the source of much curiosity to visitors to the town during last summer. Who wondered what the plaque commemorated and so well they might because its surface is now smooth and only a close inspection will reveal a ghost lettering and show that originally it depicted a message about courageous men and deeds of valour. But the passage of years and the weathering of the wind and sun has obliterated the writing and the plaque remains on the wall.

It should not be so for the deed this plaque commemoates was in the greatest tradition of Dungarvan. The Seafarers' Fund-Bead, a Dungarvan crew of sailing ships and of the intrepid mariners.

It was only when my attention was drawn to the position a few weeks ago that I came to the aid of research and "discovered" that the plaque was placed in that position to commemorate the bravery of the volunteer lifeboat crew who had gone out to see the vessel becalmed a mile away and the Coxswain was trying to discourage us from going out in the boat. He had only one life to lose and that was prepared to sacrifice that to save the crew. The Coxswain would not go into the boat, but I said if he would be a disgrace to Dungarvan, he would be a pestilence to the harbour and nobody there to save them.

At a later stage of the inquiry the Coxswain of the Lifeboat did give evidence to vindicate his own character. They went out in the lifeboat three hours in the boat going to and from the ship. He saw the signals from the ship at about 11 o'clock that night and tried to get the firemen to help him to get the boat out to the caravans. He could not get a crew. He telephoned to Dungarvan that the crew refused to put to sea that night but were still there to help him. He waited all night but still no crew turned up, only one man named O'Brien answering the call. Then he went down to the boathouse and the Dungarvan men were then there putting on their jackets.

The inquest was conducted by Coroner Dennehy with the following jury—Messrs. M. Craig, P. McNamee, Michael Kelly, Patrick Moore, Martin Donoghue, John Shea, James Walsh, Patrick Kelly, James Merry, Roger Shine, John Walsh and Roger Shanahan, and held at the Custom House Station at Ballymacurtney shortly after the fatal occurrence.

Evidence was given by two of the Morey survivors, Hon. Brian and Hon. Mr. McNamee, who deposed that they were all in the rigging of the ill-fated vessel before they ran into the sea. Brian told of how the Master took the Captain's wife while the Captain (McComber) took his little daughter, "Pry," and jumped overboard—then swam ashore around Dungarvan. McNamee detailed how after the lifeboat's first visit the passengers, including Capt. Vale and his son, had been unable to get the wind freshened and the ship drifted on to the bank where he and his son were picked up on the fore shore around Dungarvan. McNamee stated that the crew had been sending up distress signals all night but got no response from the shore.

In the meantime, William Fleetwood Shaw, a Coastguard stationed at Ballymacurtney said that they observed signals bearing on the distressed ship all night and that the Captain of the lifeboat did his utmost to get the crew together again at 6 a.m. that morning, but was unable to do so. The boat went to the strand. Shaw told the jury, "but it did not go out until the lifeboat crew had come from Dungarvan mainly through their exertions five lives were saved and that the thanks of the Morey crew would have been saved if the lifeboat had gone out an hour sooner."

Mr. John Cullinan, Secretary of the Lifeboat Committee, said that the Coxswain had said that he could not get a crew for the crew men, besides those already
