DAFT PLANNING
A recent case-note in this issue of the Leader shows the dire financial straits in which Waterford County Council finds itself and without doubt the situation is a most serious one. Having been refused a loan by the Munster & Leinster Bank, which carries the Council's account, the executive officials of the Council tried every other possible source to raise the wind without success and as a last resort the County Engineer, accompanied by the County Engineer, went to Dublin on Wednesday in an effort to get the Department to pay up some of the loans which have been approved and sanctioned for months since. But I'm afraid that unless part of the £20 million loan which is to be brought back from the U.S. by our Minister for Finance is already available our County officials will find their efforts fruitless. That supervisory overseers are appointed to do certain duties is not new. In the past couple of months since the country's economic position has entered the present phase has the Government admitted that a credit squeeze exists. WHERE ARE WE GOING

At which all this news about how hard up the Council and apparently the Department are came to me at one of the discussions which to me at any rate show a rather daft approach to Government both central and local.
Loans totalling £135,000 sought from the local Loans Fund were approved, but the £15,000 loan for cottage repairs which the bank turned down last month was left in abeyance. These cottage repairs are a huge million around the country. According to the Accountant almost a quarter of a million pounds has been spent on these repairs in the past 13 years—a colossal amount surely. But if there was value got for every pound spent this would not be too bad. My information, however, is that some of the repair work spent on it was done by the Council's Engineering Department. It is scandalous. Non-skilled workmen are employed and it says very little for the Engineering supervision about which we hear so much and which is costing the ratepayers such a pretty packet that so much money is being wasted in this way.
Another case to prove this was mentioned by Councillor Declan Ahern, Knockanore, who was told that the cottage building schemes were being supervised by the Assistant County Engineer, and who said that the foundations of one of the cottages built recently in his area "was not the best!"

COUNTY COUNCIL FACING BANKRUPTCY

Accountant Tells Of Failure To Obtain Loans

The Waterford County Engineer, Mr. J. D. Hally, and the County Accountant, Mr. F. J. O'Leary, left Dunganvar to meet officials of the Department of Local Government on Wednesday in an effort to obtain some outstanding loans to keep the County Council's cottage repair and building programmes going. Failure to obtain these loans would mean the closing down of all activity in this sphere by the end of the month, which would mean the sacking of a number of men.

This was revealed during a meeting of the Council's Finance Committee at last Monday's quarterly meeting in Dunganvar. The Chairman, Mr. C. Curran, asked the Co. Accountant to make a full statement as to the County Council's financial position at last Monday's quarterly meeting. The Council's said Mr. Curran, "Failure to obtain these loans would mean the closing down of all activity in this sphere by the end of the month, which would mean the sacking of a number of men."

Mr. O'Leary then detailed the history of the Council's cottage repair and building schemes. Since 1952 he said that the County Council had spent over £225,000 on these schemes. In 1964 the amount spent on repairs was £20,000 and in 1965 £20,000 had so far been spent in the current year.

Mr. O'Leary said that the rate of the present year, estimated at £100,000, would only afford to maintain their present labour force until the end of the present month. They had sought a loan for £15,000 for the rate of the present year but this had not yet been granted.

Mr. O'Leary said that if they were not able to get the money some £40,000 will be needed in regard to the Council's cottage building programme. Mr. O'Leary said that they were £72,000 worse off than they were at the same time last year. He said that they were £120,000 worse off than they were at the same time last year.

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£1,000 For Single Connection

The County Engineer in reply to a request from Mr. O'Leary on his statement reported at Monday's County Council meeting in Dunganvar that the cost of laying an extension of 668 yards at Coolroe, Aghleah, was £1,000. There would be no connection only to be served.

Mr. O'Leary said that he made the request to spotlight the cost of these extensions. Many people who sought them had no idea of what they cost, he said.

Mr. Curran Obviously they are very much in arrears. Mr. N. Walsh congratulated Mr. O'Leary on his statement about the position which he felt would be much worse only for Mr. O'Leary's "I believe," he said, "that all this trouble goes back to the granting of the 12% wage increase. The country could never stand up to that and now this is known by all. It's the Civil Service at Government and local level who are responsible and they have impoverished the country in general themselves and others such big increases. All of us here who objected to them were hurried down but now we have been proved correct. It isn't a democracy we have here at all but bureaucracy."

Mr. O'Leary I must agree with you, Mr. Walsh, as what you say is substantially correct. The responsibility must rest with the Civil Service plus the extreme right wing of the Trade Unions who have no regard for anything.
