ARE WE BEING OVERPLANNED?

At the last meeting of the County Council in Dungarvan Mr. Tom Launen alleged that the County was wasting authority of £3,000 spent every £1. This means that out of every £4 spent from monies collected from rates and taxes, £3 goes to the public benefit. That Mr. Launen's figures are approximately correct, I have no doubt, because questions on last year's financial statement showed that practically three-quarters of the total went on salaries and expenses.

Without doubt the administration charges amount to a fair proportion of the total expenditure but instead of attempting to streamline operations it looks as if these charges will become heavier if anything. A meeting of the Urban Council was held during the month of March, during which a brief discussion was made on a letter from the Department of Local Government pointing out the consequences of statutory obligations under the Planning and Development Act 1953 to set up a Planning Authority for the County. Moves were agreed to have already been turned down since by the Council solely on the freedom of the individual every day. Some, but not all, are necessary. But unfortunately there is nothing we can do about it. The planners told us that there are ample safeguards within the act to ensure the rights of the citizen but my goodness a citizen would want to be legally trained and an expert on the Government Code before he could be aware of what his rights are under all the Acts which demands that every County Council, Corporation and Urban Council should have its own planning authority taken into account. There is a large amount of work to be done by planning authorities in certain areas and the means of the rates to shoulder this new burden.

The cost of staffing a Planning Authority for the County has been estimated at about £6,500 per annum and this sum would have to be found entirely out of rates as no contribution will come from the Department. It looks peculiar at first sight, money is so short for planning and the public service, but the Council has failed to obtain loans for cottage repairs and certain road works that the Minister should be pressing the Council Chairman, Mr. Curran, apologetically remarked at the meeting "we haven't enough money to keep our road workers going so how can we possibly afford one."

WILL BE FORCED

It is unfortunate, however, that the Council will be forced into making these appointments, because the Act places that statutory responsibility on those who lost their lives. They are now doing what content, therefore, in the interests of the community otherwise for planning which was the source of considerable argument between Michel Tobin of Ballinlough and Bill Graves of Helwick.
