**G.A.A. COUNTY CONVENTION****Chairman Dropped A Bombshell****Nomination For Secretary's Post Out Of Order**

Because of a mere technicality, Mr. S. Grant, Eastern Board Secretary, lost his right to nominate at the election of County Board Secretary at last Sunday's County Convention held at the Friary Hall, Durrow, and Mr. D. Guid, remains in office for yet another year.

The announcement made by the Chairman of S. O. Maoladhna, in referring to the election was due to the fact that as a bombshell the 276 delegates present, and must have come as a bitter disappointment to the Eastern candidate who had been deemed fit to stand. The nomination came from the Gael Oga Club, but the Chairman explained that he was dressed in English, and he therefore, under rule 8, had to rule it out of order.

Gael Oga was the only club nominations were similarly addressed and were ruled out of order, but had been referred on the candidates in question while three motions from Gael Oga were also ruled out of order.

**OTHER ELECTIONS**

There were no surprises in the other elections for positions on the Board, the County Chairman, Mr. O'Maoldhomhna, and Treasurer, Mr. P. Kennedy, being returned unopposed.

There was one surprise result in the election for County Council representatives when Mr. S. Power, Mount Sion, Longford, was ousted by Mr. E. Cheasty, Bell, Dublin. A surprising feature of this election was the fact that Mr. T. Lannen, Durrow, who usually headed the poll, only received 74 first preference votes, to Mr. Cheasty's 80, and Mr. Power's 89, and only eventually retained his place by one vote.

The following was the voting count:- Lannen 87, quota 92, first count; T. Lannen 81, quota 92, second count; Whelan (Abbeyfield) 33; E. Cheasty 80; Whelan was eliminated and his votes distributed as follows:- Lannen 2 plus 15, 81; Whelan 2 plus 2; E. Cheasty plus 14, 94; elected. Cheasty's surplus vote went to Lannen's 92, who was then elected.

**CENTRAL COUNCIL**

There was no surprise result for Central Council Representatives with Mr. C. Ware (acting) being re-elected, along with Mr. W. Jones (Gael Oga). Mr. Ware secured 158 votes to Mr. Jones' 107.

**FINANCE**

The revenue account as submitted showed a decrease in income of £465,311 to £3,358,3 for the year, as compared with £3,358,3 for the previous year. Expenditure amounted to £5,460,18 as compared with £5,461,911 in 1964.

The balance sheet showed an increase in the Bank amounting to £6,002,2 against which there were liabilities amounting to £2,892,2. The excess of assets over liabilities amounted to £3,110.

Before the balance sheet was adopted Nicolas Mae Craith, Western Board Chairman, questioned the advisability of including an amount of £22,000 in the budget, as the assets as he said this figure painted a false picture because some of these debts were due to the Board for a considerable time and were now non-existent.

**SECRETARY'S REPORT**

In a very comprehensive report the Secretary, Mr. D. Guid, reviewing the year's work with pride, record and with while achievements in the Inter-County arena. Yet the year may be considered satisfactory, as far as our games were concerned. The all-round standard of our competitions was about average, especially in the senior grades. The conduct on our playing fields was generally good, and even though undesirable incidents occurred here and there, they were dealt with within the Rules. Undoubtedly, disciplinary action was necessary in some cases, and the decisions made will no doubt have the desired effect and should be borne in mind as a headline for the future.

Referring to the senior hurling championship, the Secretary stated that it was his sad duty to record that during the year three teams withdrew from the senior hurling championship and it was a matter of grave concern when considering that they had only 19 games in the competition. This was a record low for them and they should endeavour to improve the position during the historic year of 1965. In the interests of this direction, the Board would be welcomed and with the new season about to begin it should be kept in mind as a headline for the future.

Referring to membership the Secretary said it was now greater than ever and it was the main factor in the success of football, were virtuous living games, and they were flourishing. Activities, especially in the slack season, were being developed and organised and almost every parish today was represented by its hurlers and footballers.

**MUNSTER CHAMPIONSHIPS**

In the Intermediate section

the Secretary had little to report in the way of success, in any of the grades, apart from our Intermediate hurling side

which reached the Munster final, only to be defeated by Cork at the final hurdle.

**COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIPS**

The Secretary gave a comprehensive report on all the games played in the Senior Hurling and Football Championships. Referring to the Intermediate Hurling, he pointed out that the game had been played in all the 26 clubs and Geraldines came through their respective divisions in an uncertain manner.

The final, played in Tralee, early in November, is one easily remembered due to the unsporting tactics which were a feature throughout.

Mr. O'Maoldhomhna said: "The game was a final marred by free for all which led to a disastrous ending." The subsequent investigation by den Judge of the Declaration of the County Board, at which independence of the offending party was being denied for the greater part of the game, was condemned as being a secondary competition.
