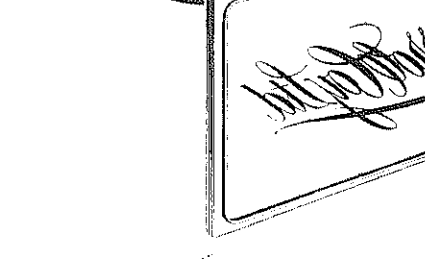

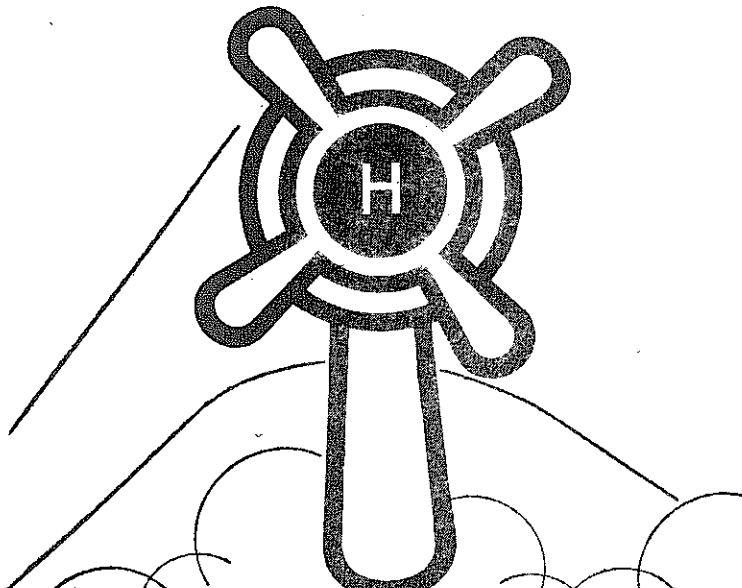

A parade led by a Colour Party from the Fermoy Girls' Pipe Band formed up at the New Market at 8.15 p.m. and marched to the Church of the Immaculate Conception where Mass was celebrated in Irish by Rev. Maurice Condon C.C., Tallow. A place was reserved in the Church for Old I.R.A. veterans, children and Military Party. Rev. C. F. Foster, Rector, Knocknaree, had a special Ned Power, N.T. plaque. Amongst those who sat on the right of the altar

A party of military from the 1st Armoured Squadron, Paratroopers, rendered honours at the elevation. Whilst a trumpet sounded the General Salute. The Epistle was read in Irish by Mr. Ned Power, N.T. After the Mass a plaque to the memory of the 1916 Rising was unveiled in the grounds of the Boys' National School by Paddy Romyne, Tallow, one of the last surviving officers of the Cork No. 2 Brigade I.R.A. The Proclamation was read in Irish by Professor Seamus O'Mahony, Vocational Teacher, Araglen, delivered an oration in the course of which he spoke on the high ideals of the leaders of the Rising and said the cause they died for had not yet been achieved. 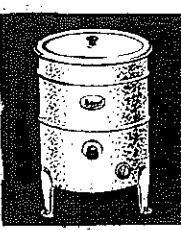
NOTICE BY THE REVENUE COMMISSIONERS TURNOVER TAX ON DANCES LIABILITY TO TAX On and from the 1st May, 1966, receipts from all dances will be liable to Turnover Tax at the rate of 10 per cent, except where the attendance is limited to 100 persons and the admission charge does not exceed 4 pence. The 10% rate of tax will be chargeable on money, paid or payable for admissions to a dance, and on any payments for goods or services, supplied at a dance where the payment for the goods or services is included in the charge for admission or is a condition for admission. It will not be chargeable on receipts from goods or services where the purchase is entirely at the option of the patron and in no way a condition for admission. The 2% rate of tax will continue to apply to these receipts as at present. ACCOUNTABILITY FOR TAX The promoter of the dance will be accountable for payment of the tax in all cases where the 10% rate applies. ADVANCE NOTIFICATION OF DANCE The promoter must notify the Collector-General (Turnover Tax), Aras Brugha, 910 Upper O'Connell Street, Dublin 1, in writing of his intention to promote a dance or series of dances. In the case of dances to be held between the 1st May and the 31st May, 1966, 7 days advance notice will be sufficient. For dances to be held after the 31st May not less than 14 days' notice must be given. Forms for giving notice (Form No. T17) are available at District Offices of Inspectors of Taxes and at the Office of the Collector-General. NOTIFICATION TO PROPRIETOR When the Collector-General receives the notification of intention to promote a dance he will send an acknowledgment to the promoter and will at the same time send a notice on Form No. T18 to the proprietor of the premises where the dance is to be held. Where turnover tax is payable, it will be an offence punishable by law for the proprietor of any premises to hold a dance, to allow a dance to be held in his premises unless he has received the Form No. T18 from the Collector-General in respect of the dance. PAYMENT OF TAX The tax due in respect of each dance must be sent by the promoter to the Collector-General not later than seven days after the date of the dance, together with particulars of the number of admissions, etc. A form for this purpose will be sent to the promoter along with the acknowledgment of his notification. If the proprietor of a dance-hall himself promotes dances regularly and at frequent intervals he may apply to the Collector-General for permission to remit tax on a monthly basis. Where permission is granted special instructions will be issued to the persons concerned.

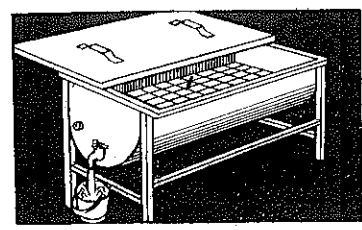

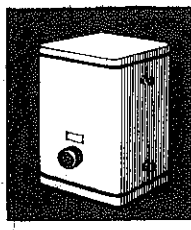

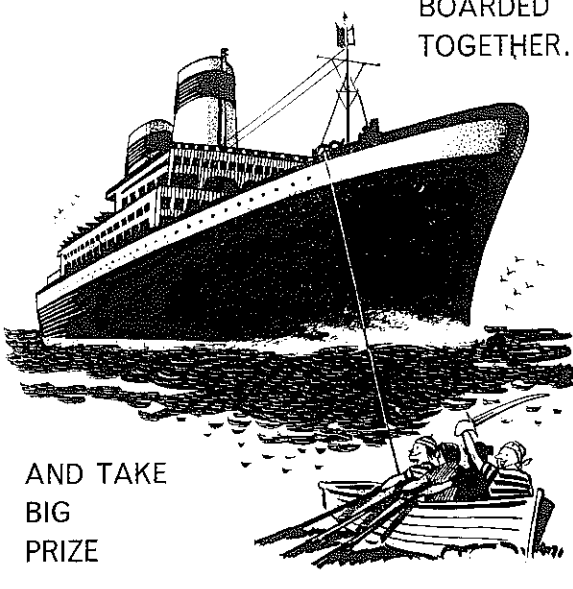
