ALCOHOLICS ANONYMOUS

Alcoholics Anonymous will come to Dungarvan next Sunday week, May 22 and a number of speakers from A.A. and the Medical Profession will discuss the problems of drink at a public meeting to be held in Lawlor's Hotel at 3.30 p.m. Alcoholics Anonymous is a unique organisation in that it makes less demands on its members than any other society and you can be a member while still remaining completely anonymous. It has no name, no address, no details of what you do. You have to make no promises about attending the weekly or monthly meetings. You don't have to make any special skin colour and your nationality can be anything. In fact this is an organisation which is open to everyone and anyone provided and this is the only provision they think they have a problem handling alcohol and provided they want to do something about it. Alcoholics Anonymous is not for those who think with a little pull that they can still settle down as normal drinkers. Rather it is for those men and women who set about proving their normality not just once but time after time out of number. Each time they have failed that little bit more miserably. Each time they are a little bit less self-respect and that little bit more remorse and self-loathing. Each time they are left with that particular feeling which is a mixture of helplessness and hopelessness. Each time they send the bottle to make life barely tolerable again. Alcoholics Anonymous is for those who earlier or later realise that liquor and themselves simply cannot go along together. Alcohol is not for the man who finally admits that it is one enemy he must not, not can not, take on.

Nobody in A.A. will try to prove you are an alcoholic. Their only function is to help you to make up your mind if you are a person with a problem like theirs and if you want help to turn over a new leaf. Then you want find any greater help anywhere than the help of members of A.A. When you go to A.A. you may be surprised when nobody tries to solve the story of your seeing from you. You may be equally surprised to hear how frankly members will tell you their story. And unless you are very insensitive you will be shattered by the humility and the honesty of these people who have gone through hell on earth and lived to tell the tale.

So if you are one with a drink problem, you could well be doing yourself a favour for which you will be thankful for the rest of your life by attending the meeting in Dungarvan next Sunday week. It certainly is an opportunity which should not be missed.

CRUISE LINER'S VISIT
