## PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight

**SOMETHING IS ROTTEN**

A sermon recently preached in Limerick by Father Liam Ryan, M.A., D.D., University College, Cork, contained many hard-hitting facts and is sure to be quoted far from the Treaty City.

Fr. Ryan suggested that there was something rotten in the state of Ireland, and without mincing his words he hit out at unjust employers and workers who were active in fraternities but idle in the workshops.

He spoke in no uncertain terms of the tremendous unrest in Ireland today and the terrible fact that a recent survey carried out by the International Labour Organisation showed that of nineteen allies investigated, this country which is professionally ninety-nine per cent. Christian, had the worst record for industrial disputes. He said that too many Irish bosses and workers seem to know more about angels and saints than about one another.

Expanding on this theme Fr. Ryan said that workers and employers were organised into two opposing camps, each preparing for the battle which inevitably comes, each seeking to discover the worst aspects of the other. "We are all human beings," Fr. Ryan is quoted as saying, "and surely it is time that we at least learned to talk to one another honestly and sincerely and not merely reciting the party line which we have learned by heart back-stage."

Fr. Ryan also had this to say: "We live in a peculiar world, a world that has explored planetary space, but has yet to explore the space which separates men from each other. We have thrown bridges across every river in the world but we have not built bridges from people to people, from worker to employer, from Catholic to Protestant, from North to South in Ireland. We have learned how to communicate with other people at the ends of the earth, but not to communicate with our next door neighbour here in Ireland."

The truths in Fr. Ryan's sermon cannot be denied and were these faults which he so precisely relates to be overcome then I think we would have gone a long way on the road towards establishing proper labour relations between employer and worker, the lack of which is responsible mainly for the unhappy position the country is in today.

### SISTER GETS COURT INJUNCTION AGAINST BROTHER

**Litigation Over Fifteen Acre Lismore Holding**

A small holding of 15 acres which was described as being of almost mountainous land at Monahull, Lismore, was the subject of an action between a sister and brother at Dungarvan Circuit Court before Judge S. Fawcett last Tuesday.

The plaintiff was Mrs. Joan Butler, Monahull, and the defendant was her brother John Coleman, Junior, same address. She claimed an injunction restraining the defendant from trespassing on the lands damaged for trespass and a mandatory injunction compelling the defendant to remove the buildings he had on the land on the holding.

In his defence a married man who works at Mount Mellery, had a counter-claim seeking an order that plaintiff hold the lands as trustee for defendant on foot of a deed dated December 16, 1950, and a further order that plaintiff should forthwith execute a proper transfer of the lands to the defendant.

In his defence to plaintiff's claim, the defendant denied that the lands were the property of the plaintiff and claimed that he is or was entitled to the use or occupation of the land or that she suffered any loss or damage.

In support of his counter-claim, defendant averred that in or about May 1965, the plaintiff with full knowledge of an agreement alleged to have been entered into between himself and his father, fraudulently and with intent, to deprive defendant of the lands in question, transferred the land to her as full owner.

### WAS REGISTERED OWNER

When Mr. Carroll rose to make his submission Judge Fawcett said that what defendant wanted him to do was to make his own order made in 1965 and he had no intention of doing this unless something very substantial was submitted to make him change his mind. The only way in which Mr. Carroll could proceed was to make an order to have the order set aside. Prima facie, Mrs. Butler was the registered owner.

Mr. Carroll said that he would call evidence to show that there was fraud in her agreement was concerned. He would also call evidence to show that the disputes between John Senior and John Junior arose when she came from England. His case is, said Mr. Carroll, "that when John Coleman Senior transferred the place to my client having witnessed the acquisition and subsequently acquired title, my client then had an equitable right to call on him to perfect the title."

Judge Fawcett then granted the injunctions claimed by plaintiff and granted a decree of £25 damages for trespass against the defendant. He made an order that the lands be vacated within a week and struck out the counter-claim. He granted plaintiff costs and expenses with a stay of the decree pending an appeal.

### SAVE THE WATERFORD-MALLOW RAILWAY LINE

**Protest Meeting Call To Transport Minister**

A protest against the proposed closure of the Mullingar Waterford railway line was made at a meeting attended by public representatives from Waterford, Cork and South Tipperary in the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on last Saturday.

A resolution, proposed by Mr. Desmond Kelly, Waterford Council of Trade Unions, and seconded by Mr. Norman Walsh, Vice-Chairman, County Council, was passed viewing the proposal "with grave concern" and adding: "Public transport is an essential service which must, if necessary, be maintained by State subsidy. We are deeply concerned at the serious consequences which will follow the close-down of this section of the line. In addition to the loss of employment, we face the position where all Waterford County, with its unlimited industrial and tourist potential, is denied the facilities of rail transport."

"The railway is an important link between parts of Waterford and Cork, with Roslare and the entire south of Ireland for passenger and goods service."

The meeting called on the Minister to save the line and it was decided to send a deputation to him.

Mr. C. Curran, Chairman of the Waterford County Council, acted as chairman, and Mr. J. G. Dwyling, Waterford County Secretary, as secretary.

The attendance included the Mayor of Waterford, Councillor P. Browne, as well as Dalí Deputies and members of public bodies from East Cork and Waterford.

### NO EFFECTIVE DEFENCE

That concluded the evidence on behalf of plaintiff and Mr. Carroll then said that if his Lordship did not allow him to pursue his counter-claim he had no effective defence.

Judge Fawcett said there was another course of action open to Mr. Carroll but Mr. Carroll said that he would not apply for an adjournment to join other parties to the action as the costs would be too great.

His Lordship then said that the holding was one of 15 acres of almost mountainous land and a house. In March 1955 John Coleman Senior had been registered by him at that Court as owner and following the transfer to plaintiff in June 1965 she was registered as owner and was now in fact the owner of the land. "It is as clear as daylight to me" said the Judge, "that unless and until somebody shows me with all the necessary persons joined in a separate action to set aside her ownership."
