THE MEANS TEST
Referring to the operation of the Means Test, the Minister said that there was a great deal of trouble and comment about this as there appeared to be discrepancies between the various Authorities on its operation. The new proposals aimed to bring uniformity to the system with variations as between urban and rural dwellers. There would be a provision for a book among the public setting out the rights of each individual concerned. It was also intended to provide assistance in the purchase of drugs and medicines for people in the middle-income group and he hoped this would be in operation by the end of the year.

URBAN COUNCIL MEETING ADJOURNED
Harbour Master's Berement

DISTURBING DOCUMENT
The Minister concluded his summing up by informing the members that the Report on Mental Illness, which he described as a disturbing document, would be published shortly. With more special attention to the expansion of the public health nursing service and the help of private organizations he hoped that the percentage who would have to be treated in mental hospitals would be drastically cut. In regard to the treatment of mental handicapped persons, he said that he had asked for the setting up of local voluntary bodies where these did not exist, to help out with this problem as he was something which needed a lot of local understanding and sympathy.

MEMBERS' VIEWS
Mr. N. Walsh opened the discussion by asking for a specific estimate as to the cost of the services outlined. He said that the country could afford the type of services outlined. Mr. J. Lannon and Mr. C. Curran referred to the centralization of hospitals in Waterford and voiced disapproval of this. Mr. Lannon said that they had a hospital in Dungarvan which should be enlarged and modernized so as to deal with patients from the Dungarvan and Western areas of the county.

OTHER POINTS
On the matter of Regional Boards the Minister did not agree that these would lead to greater bureaucratic control and he felt that the fear expressed by the members of a loss of control between people and Board was not a real one. He said he would agree, subject to Government approval, to the proposal that drugs and medicines should be made available through chemists.

MEMBERS' VIEWS
Mr. M. Galgley thought the setting up of Regional Boards would be a step away from the existing individual contact of the people with members who formed the existing Health Authorities. Mr. Walsh also objected to this proposal as he felt that Regional Boards would only result in the placing of more power in the hands of officials. He suggested that the Minister should think twice before making this move as it would only mean greater bureaucratic administration and would take away the democratic rights of the elected representatives. Mr. Walsh said that if this is put in the hands of bureaucrats, the only way will be the limit where costs are concerned and they could even go to inter space.
