ALL WRAPPED UP

One of the main points made by the Minister for Health, Mr. Sean Flanagan, when he paid a special visit to Dungarvan to receive the official visit of the Health Authority. Prior to his arrival tight-lipped, white-faced officials raced hither and thither to seal the approach as a matter of fact I thought myself that it anything it was all a little overdone and that the elected representatives would have been brought a little more into the picture.

Now contrast that picture with what happened on Monday evening when two Bishops and their wives, as well as members of a delegation from the Court of St. Patrick, the Health Authority. One was our own Bishop, Rev. Dr. Michael Russell, and the other was the Protestant Bishop of Cashel and Emly, Rt. Rev. Dr. Cessil de Pauley. Not one official was there to receive the Bishops when they arrived and they were discourteously left standing outside the Courthouse until the meeting was held under the leadership of member of the Authority arrived, took in the situation at a glance, and took action.

The failure of the officials to be present in time on Monday evening, something which did not happen the previous Thursday morning shows what a mixed up sense of values they seem to possess.

FIVE-DAY WEEK

Dungarvan Urban Council noted the residents and traders of the town in its publication last week that consequent on the introduction of a five-day week for members of the outdoor staff, the town cleaning service would not operate on Saturdays for the future.

This of course means that the last refuse collection for the week will take place sometime on Friday afternoon and from then until Monday morning. Friday and Saturday are the two busiest days of the week where the workers are concerned and they are still observed by the public of the areas both urban and rural, as the days on which the supplies are purchased are concerned. On this account shops are bound to have an enormous amount of stuff to be dumped while the streets are much more likely to become littered with paper wrappings and cartons.

Recently we criticised the stench that was coming from the town dump and when the matter was raised with the Urban Council, the officials said that they were doing their best. The town clerks criticised the action of certain people for dumping in the various areas around the perimeter of the town. At the same time he admitted that the town dump was kept closed at night to prevent indiscriminate dumping. He added that when the waste reached the stage where there will not even be a refuse collection on Saturday. How then can trade be blamed for trying to rid the town trash in whatever way they can?

I know that the outdoor staff are entitled to their five-day week but could not their off-day be, say, Thursday, which is half the week, and which would not be such a busy period as Friday evenings and Saturday mornings? Or is it a case on the part of the officials of not being able to get the full volume of the town? The whole thing looks peculiar to me.
