**WATERFORD
DEFEATED IN
NATIONAL HURLING
LEAGUE GAME**

**Kilkenny's Display
Unimpressive**

Kilkenny 3-13; Waterford 2-9

Present National Hurling League champion Kilkenny had a successful start in defense of their title when they defeated Waterford by 3-13 to 2-9 in the opening game of the 1966-67 competition at the goal. Kilkenny, who had won the day last but even though they emerged victors by seven points their display against a weak Waterford side far from impressive. The prospects of retaining the title at the moment are anything but bright.

Conditions were ideal for the game which was held in very good trim despite the rain which fell on Saturday but the contest lacked any great drive and at times proved mediocre for

GREAT HEIGHTS
