PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight

C-O-DY — October 25, 1966, is a date on my calendar with which I have circled as it will mark the closing day of the Waterford-Mallow railway line by Coras Iompair Eireann, and the completion of the closure of the line was first made at the last meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council by Council Chairman Tom Kyne, who selected that he had been so informed by an executive of C.I.E. While March 25 is known on the Catholic Calendar as the Day of Pentecost, which has now become known as the day of denunciation of C.O.D. for the local railway where future generations are concerned.

Waterford Urban Council decided on the decision of C.I.E. to close the line at their last meeting and they decided to take a last, tornon stand by asking the Minister for Transport to receive nothing from C.I.E. Personally I believe they are only wasting their time and their money as I believe was the case when the original delegation that went to Dublin to discuss the matter with the officials have been told that the decision to close the Waterford-Mallow line was taken as long as four years ago when the Master Plan to make C.I.E. an economic organisation was being put up. So far nothing has been done by C.I.E. to prove the trade on the line as a matter of fact it has been the other way round. It would appear that the official statistics on the line are not correct in the sense that statistics could be prepared to prove that the line has become an unnecessary expense.

The Minister was able to go into the Dail when the matter was being discussed and said that the line was operating at a loss. What about the income of the line by a better rearranging of train schedules? And even if such loss could not be proved what about the cost of maintaining the line. Transport provide for the poorer classes who have to rely solely on public transport? And again here we come to the Duke of Devonshire's statement that the line will be liquidated or will it cost as much if not more to close the line?

I have been told that the amount of compensation, pensions, and public assistance which will arise from the redundancies that are now bound to occur will total almost as much while the main cost of maintaining the line will be gone with the great volume of traffic which the closure of the rail will divert to them can go to any heights. So there is not only from the social point of view but also from the economic standpoint the closing of this railway is wrong. But the author has now made his mind right or wrong it appears that those responsible will stand by it.

The eagerly awaited clash of Abbeyside and Ballygunner in the final round of this year's senior hurling championship is now history, the memory of which will be pestered forever by an Abbeyside citizen who suffered one of the most humiliating defeats ever in the history of the club in a senior championship, when they suffered annihilation by the Eastern side who had twenty points (6-8) to 0-6, to spare at the finish of this game, played at the First Field, Dungarvan, last Sunday, a game which to the least of it, proved a complete anti-climax and a bitter disappointment to the Western jokers.

POTENTIAL CHAMPIONS

Ballygunner who are being hailed as potential champions this year completed a phenomenal display of rugged and uncompromising hurling coupled with a good combination at fast moving attack.

ON RECEIVING END

They had the wind in the first half but were on the receiving end of the third quarter. Then suddenly of Joe Flynn and Pat Enright were completely blotted out and midway through this half Mick Kiely, the captain, was shaken at this stage and with many of their "big guns" well below form were on the brink of hurling disaster.

Going into the second quarter they were leading 0-4 to 0-1 and after twenty minutes Tom Carter broke through for the goal. Abbeyside were

in this sector with Enright moving to attack and Padie Hogan moving to defend. But this move failed and once again the Tarry Cummins and Jim Phelan continued to get the better of the exchanges for Ballygunner here.

But Abbeyside's troubles did not end here. They were hounding back to attack and none of the forwards could make any headway whatsoever, especially their full line who were completely beaten out by the gallant Ballygunner rear-guard which gave no quarter in their own goal area.

THE SCORES
