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THE GREAT STROKER
Marked the anniversary of the death of one of the most remarkable men of the late 17th century whose name is becoming a legend because of the masterly leading power he possessed. He was Valentine Greatrakes of Albion who served as an officer in the parliamentary army in Ireland under Lord Cromwell in the time of Cromwell.

When the monarchy was restored Greatrakes was banished and he fled to France. He was a Clerk of the Peace in London where he was associated with his remarkable healing powers first drew attention. According to the stories which have come down to us from that time he was supposed to be able to cure people suffering from diseases by merely laying his hands on them. As word got out of his mysterious powers, the people flocked to him from all parts of the country while many were cured. Some had absolute faith in him, others criticized and ridiculed him while he became the subject of a great outpouring of abuse. His name and fame were, however, made when King Charles II invited Greatrakes to London where some of his cures were examined and certified by the Royal Society.

It is on record that all manner of pains, aches, and rheumatism left the body when the "Touch Doctor" for so he was known, stroked his patients with his hands. Greatrakes was indeed a remarkable man but whether he possessed all the healing powers of healing claimed for him or was just a mere charlatan we will never really know. He died in 1643.

SALMON FISHER-
MEN'S APPEALS FAIL

Early Morning Incident
On Blackwater

Two Blackwater salmon fish-
men were convicted and
fined at Cappoquin District
Court on April 28 last arising
from an incident which occurred
near Coonagh pier, Villiersstown.
In the early hours of Monday
morning, May 17, 1966, success-
fully appealed against the
fines at Dungarvan Circuit
Court on Tuesday.

They were Patrick Ronayne,
Coonagh, Villiersstown, who was
fined a total of £17 with £4-4
costs on charges of obstructing
the Waterkeepers E. Montayne and
T. Moran in the execution of
their duty on May 17, 1966, and
having a salmon unlawfully in
his possession on the occasion
and his brother-in-law,
Thomas Daly, Droichead, Villiers-
town, who was fined £10 with
£4-4 costs on a charge of hav-
ing a salmon unlawfully in his
possession.

Mr. S. Brosnan, B.L. District
Judge, presided. Mr. E. Keane, solicitor
was for Inspector W. Wade who
prosecuted on behalf of the Lis-
more Board of Conservators and
Mr. P. O'Driscoll, solicitor,
was for the defendants.
Mr. Brosnan stated that at 3
a.m. on Monday, May 17, 1966,
the two Waterkeepers were on
duty on the river Blackwater in
a boat near Coonagh. They
saw a boat in the river and
it was the defendant Ronayne's
boat which they saw. They
observed that the boat was
being towed towards them and
that there was a salmon in the
boat. Later in the day it was
found that Daly had offered a salmon
for sale to three different local
salmon dealers.

Edward Montayne said that
it was a Waterkeeper's boat
which was towed towards them
at 3 a.m. on Monday, May 17, 1966.
He said that he was on duty
for the Lismore Board for the
past 9 years. On the morning
of Monday, May 17, 1966, he
was on duty with Waterkeeper
Miriam near Coonagh pier. He saw
two boats, one of which was
being towed towards them.
As they approached Ronayne's
boat came towards them and
held them up while Daly's boat
went away. Later, they found
Daly's boat, which had his
name on it, beached inside the
pier. It was in full operation
and was not due to expire until
6 p.m. It was illegal to fish
before that hour.

COCK AND BULL STORY
In reply to Mr. O'Driscoll who
cross-examined, witness said
that he never heard Ronayne
say anything about the weir
quarter mile above the fishing
wharf when it should not.
He had never heard that the
weir was a bomb and that
where the local fishermen
were concerned.

When Mr. O'Driscoll put it to
witness that the defendant
against the defendants was all
a cock-and-bull story to cover
up what was happening at the
weir, Waterkeeper Montayne re-
plied "Yes".

In further cross-examination
witness agreed that the weir
was falling at 4 or 5 minutes to
six when he saw it. It would
then be fishing. He said that
witness would be supposed to start
fishing at 6 a.m. In his opinion it
would be impossible to get
to fish a draught net in the
river at high water due to the
rise in the tide.

Thomas Moran, the other
Waterkeeper, said that he was
also employed by the Lismore
Board for 9 years.
Waterkeeper Montayne on this
occasion, at 5.30 a.m. it would
be within the week-end closing
period. He said that he had a
net off the rocks and as they
went towards it, Ronayne came
on in his boat and held them
up while the other boat got
away. Ronayne's boat came
right up to them and was on
top of his own. He said that
he had to hold on to his own
boat as it was in danger of col-
liding. They later followed the
other boat which was Daly's
property and found it pulled in
on the slab in the mill. They
then went back down the river
and passed the weir at about
five to six and it was then in
fishing order.

At this stage Mr. Brosnan ex-
plained to Judge Fawcett that
the weir was in fact a licensed
fishing weir.

Cross-examined by Mr. O'Driscoll
witness admitted that the
weir was fishing. The Fishery
Inspector also agreed that they
were in an 18 foot boat while Mr. Ron-
ayne was only in a 12 foot boat.
He could not remember what
Ronayne said to him on the
occasion. He did not think it
had anything to do with the
weir but sounded like "Beware!"
He repeated the fact that the
weir was fishing before time to
the Inspector.

Mr. O'Driscoll said that he was
submitting that the Waterkeep-
ers knew that the weir was
operating illegally but did not
bring about it as they were friend-
ly with the owners.

IMPOSSIBLE
Mr. E. M. Wade, Castlebar,
County Kerry, Inspector to the Board
said he met Ronayne and Daly
at Coonagh pier and asked them
to account for the salmon they
had offered to him. They
denied that they had the
fish but later said they had
caught them in the draught net
at high tide. Witness held that
it was impossible to catch fish
at this time as there was a rise
of 11-7 in the river.

In cross-examination, witness
said that the reason why he
waited until the following Morn-
ing to issue summonses was
because he always waited until the sea-
son closed.
Joseph O'Keefe, licensed sal-
mon dealer, Ballinacash, Clash-
more, said that Daly approached
him to buy four salmon but
he refused to take them.
Michael O'Connor, licensed
salmon dealer, Cappoquin, said
that he approached him between
12.30 and 1.15 on the same day
and offered four salmon for sale
from both the Ronayne. He did
not buy them then but his
brother collected two of them
later in the evening.
Witness received salmon dealer
William Curragh, said
the met Daly that day at
Coonagh pier and later after
hearing certain things he left
them at Daly's house and told
them to go into Villiersstown for
a Guard. The Guard arrived
at the pier at quarter to six
and the Waterkeepers passed
at 5.30 or 6.00 p.m. The
Guard whistled at them three
times but they paid no atten-
tion and kept going.

Mayor's Reply To
Mr. Corish

Dear Sir,
Surely even at election time
the voters are entitled to ex-
pect some degree of responsibil-
ity from the leaders of a Party.
It is not from the lesser lights
Mr. Corish's speech at Traamore
however appears to be a clear
indication that the intelligence
of the Waterford voters is held
in utter contempt.

In the first place, the asser-
tion that there has been no
major development in Social
Welfare in the 1948-57 period
when this Department was con-
trolled by a Labour Minister in
the Coalition Government.

Of course, it is not as if
that three year period there
was no salary increase in
the rates of some but by in-
creasing all of the existing
Social Services. And in the
second place Mr. Corish has
made no attempt to assume that
the voters will forget the de-
velopment that have taken
place under the present Labour
Government.

In a short letter it is im-
possible to detail all the ex-
pansions in Social Welfare that
have taken place but there
has been at least one Social
Welfare Bill every year since
1957 which made many ex-
pansions in the cover of both
Social Insurance and Social
Assistance in addition to en-
suring that the various rates
of benefit increased at more
than twice the rate of increase
of the Cost of Living.

In view of Mr. Corish's ex-
istence of Social Welfare,
however, it may help to pre-
vent him making similar fol-
lowish statements in future if I
round him for instance, that
the Contributory Old Age Pen-
sion is not of such long stand-
ing as he appears to think.
This measure which has been
of such great benefit to in-
