THE BY-ELECTION LIKELY OUTCOME

Summerside Magistrate, every what will be the outcome of the election and if the Government were subjected to an intense political bombardment by the Fine Gael, retain it? or could the Fine Gael win the election campaign? The Fine Gael Party was well served by a team of Cabinet Ministers, Seoirlaoch Deputies and Senators. The Fine Gael Party were seconded by their Leader, with the Labour interests were handled by the Labour Leader and a good number of Labour deputies.

But it was all very mild and unexciting. The morning after an uneventful night for the door sport as rain dropped from a leaden November sky and in Dungarvan where we had a clash of interests between Flanna Fail and Fine Gael and a small group braved the elements on the Square to listen first to Mr. Daughan O'Malley and then stayed on to hear Mr. Liam Conroy.

In the 1965 General Election there was a change in the picture. The combined Flanna Fail vote tumbled to 13,616. Keen O'Donnell 5,652 while the combined opposition dropped to 14,107 votes. Fine Gael 5,330 and Walsh 2,083.

Our last figures, if these last elections show, is these last elections show that the Fine Gael platform preference poll tumbled down to 1,916. The R.T.E. cameras mounted on a small truck followed the lorry which was descended with the Government bloc on December 7th either Fine Gael or Labour should get the seat. Fine Gael speakers stood by in the crowd offered to lay him £100 to £1 that Fine Gael would come up with a grandiose policy for education before polling day. He did not come up with a £100. Mr. O'Malley's tip was apparently well-founded because the Fine Gael National Executive did in fact come up with the education policy on the day night. But after that it all became very much again.

Flanna Fail will surely need to put up the Fine Gael and Labour candidates more than likely following in that order. If there is a second round, everything will depend on the transfers from the Fine Gael supporters register and a solid protest vote against the Government then the bulk of the transfer should elect either one or other of their candidates. But somehow or other they don't think that will be the way. While the Fine Gael Party are advising their supporters to vote Fine Gael and 2 Labour, this process is not operating 100% and in reality a Labour transfer should see a tilt bulk of their number two go to the Flanna Fail candidate on polling day.

One in King Mr. Seoirlaoch O'Gorman, Minister for Industry & Commerce was giving the locals a touch of his class while he was in Ardmore. Mr. Charles Hayes, a teller of the local farmers that Flanna Fail were the only party which had the farmers' interests at heart. Who ever believed that there was no love affair a few short months previously at the meetings on the steps of Merlin Square waiting for an audience. I suppose times change with the times and that's the way its goes.

Anyway it can be said that if the Fine Gael had done nothing else, it brought most of the Government Ministers face to face with the electors in the constituency, in most cases. Not first time. And another thing it should prove a great sales tool for the Mercedes group.

THE PARISH OF ARDMORE

THE GRANGE

The Parish History of the Diocese reveals some very interesting facts about the Parish of Ardmore and Grange which it calls one of the most

SALMON FISHER-MEN'S APPEALS FAIL**Early Morning Incident
On Blackwater**

Two Blackwater salmon fisher-men who were convicted and fined at Coonan Pier, Villerstown, Court on April 26 last, arising from incidents which occurred near Coonan pier, Villerstown, in the early hours of Monday morning, yesterday, finally appealed against the fines at Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday.

They met Patrick Ronayne, Villerstown, who was fined a total of £17 with £4 costs on charges of obstructing Waterkeepers E. Montayne and T. Moran in the execution of their duty on July 19, 1965, when they had been unable to land his boat.

Thomas Daly, Dromore, Villerstown, was fined £10 with £4 costs as a charge of being in his possession without his permission.

Mr. Brosnan, B.L. magistrate, Mr. Brosnan, B.L. magistrate, was the Inspector who prosecuted on behalf of the Local Board of Conservancy and Mr. O'Donnell, Solicitor, was for the defendants.

Mr. Brosnan stated that at 6 a.m. on Monday, May 17, 1965, the two Waterkeepers passed duty on the river Blackwater in their boat and found a boat owned by the defendant Ronayne's boat rowed towards them and obstructed them with the other boat in which Daly was got away. The Waterkeepers enquired if Daly's boat was in the area but there was no one in it. Later in the day it was found that Daly had offered a salmon to the two different fishermen.

Edward Montayne said that he was a Waterkeeper employed by the Lismore Board for the past 9 years. On the morning in question at 5 a.m. he was on duty with Waterkeeper Moran at Coonan pier. He saw 2 boats on the river Blackwater and went to the pier to get his boat ready. When he approached Ronayne's boat came towards them and held them up while Daly's boat got away. Later they found Daly's boat which had been pulled up to the pier. As the week-end fishing was in operation and was not due to expire until 6 a.m. it was illegal to fish before that hour.

COCK AND BULL STORY

In reply to Mr. O'Donnell who cross-examined witness said that when he heard Daly say anything about the net a quarter mile down the river he had not heard that there was no one in it. He had never heard that there was a bone of contention between the two local fishermen.

When Mr. O'Donnell put it to witness that the prosecution against the defendants was all based on the evidence of the two waterkeepers covering what was happening on the river, Waterkeeper Montayne replied "no".

In further cross examination witness said that the week-end fishing was finished at 4 o'clock on Saturday morning and was about 4 or 5 miles from the pier when he saw it. It would then be fishing illegally as it would not be supposed to start again until the next day. It would be impossible to 2 men to fish a draught net in the river at high water due to the tide in the tide.

Thomas Moran, the other Waterkeeper, said that he was also employed by the Lismore Board for 9 years. He was with Waterkeeper Montayne on this occasion. At 5.30 a.m. it would be within the week-end closing time for the fishery. He saw the net off the rocks and as they went towards it, Ronayne came in his boat and held them up while the other boat got away. The other boat got away. They were held up to them and was out of his boat. Witness said that he had to hold on to his own boat as it was in danger of capsizing. The other boat which was Daly's boat pulled in on the "spill". They then went back down the river and left the weir as far as they could and it was then about five to six when they saw it.

At this stage Mr. Brosnan explained to Judge Fawell that the weir was in fact a breach.

Cross-examined by Mr. O'Donnell witness admitted that he was not satisfied that the waterkeeper's knew that the weir was operating illegally but did not know about it as they were friendly with the owners.

IMPOSTERS

Mr. E. M. White, Castlebar, roche, Inspector to the Board said he met Ronayne and Daly at Coonan pier and asked them to account for the salmon they had offered for sale. They denied first that they had the fish but later said they had caught them in the draught net at high tide. Witness said that when they had sold the fish at this time as there was a rise of 11'-7" in the river.

In cross-examination witness said that the reason why he waited until the following morning to issue summons was

he always waited until the salmon closed.

Joseph O'Keefe, licensed salmon dealer, Ballinaclash, Clonmel, said that Daly approached him and paid the same day and offered him a sum on behalf of Ronayne. He did not buy them then but his lorry collected two of them later in the evening.

William Carr, licensed salmon dealer, Curraghass, said he met Daly that day at Kereny and took the tour salmon boat which had been later arrested bearing certain titles when he took back at Daly's house. That evening his son collected two of the fish.

Patrick Ronayne said that he was at Coonan pier at 6 a.m. on May 17, 1965, when he met Mr. Brosnan and was getting his nets ready to go fishing. The Waterkeepers approached him on the river. He told them that the weir was there but the net was not. The Waterkeepers said that the net was not there but the big boss is in this and he has to get it off. He heard Mr. Montayne say that the net was to be taken off the pier. The Guard arrived at the pier at quarter to six and the Waterkeepers passed him through the net. The Guards waited at the pier three times but they paid no attention to him and kept going.

Witness denied that he obstructed the Waterkeepers in any way. He said that the net was not there but the old net was still there.
