BACKWARD GLANCE

This week let us take a backward glance at last week's political happenings. The General Election was turned out to be at a number of centres before the polling stations finally closed at 9 p.m. on Wednesday night and the vital votes had all been cast.

Last week I commented on the gentlemanly manner in which the campaign had been conducted, where both sides were concerned and referred to the absence of the cut and thrust of old time elections. It is now clear that I spoke too soon, for while what I said about the conduct of the campaign where public meetings were concerned was correct up to that the cut and thrust appears to have been reserved for the final day and far that waited for the final few hours of that day.

Massive is the only word I can think of to describe the opposition mounted by both main political parties, Fine Gael and Fianna Fail, to get every possible supporter to the polling stations. My observations were that Dungarvan was no exception. My assistants have told me that what happened there was fair indication of the activity throughout the entire constituency. Both parties were served by a primitive system of posters inside and outside the booths while there was no lack of transport. Cars with every thinkable registration number seemed to have converged on the constituency and the agents of the drivers and the agents of the election workers were as varied as the car numbers. To indicate what I mean, one had Jerry Wicklow at 9 o'clock that morning to represent the Gaels and Fine Gael, and at 10 o'clock and having worked through the night, still to remain in power and still to remain in power than the combined opposition showed in wanting to dislodge them and their determination to win.

Briefly I think that Flanna Fail won the election because they went out to win it and put everything they had into it. They realised it was going to be a close affair and they went after every vote and that was how they won the favourable result in the final tally.

The other comment I would like to make on this score is on the rôle of the Labour Party. I am sure that they did not help the P.D. much in getting the votes there. I am not inclined to believe this as informed observers have told me that there was a good turnout in the constituency and it is hard to ascertain that such a popular man as the Flanna Fail candidate must undoubtedly be in his own right not only a little better than 50 per cent of the city votes share with his Fine Gael opponent who must also have received quite a bit of vote down there.

THE MESSAGE
The result of the election here can now rightly be taken by the Taoiseach, Mr. Jack Lynch, as an endorsement of the Government's policy and a go-ahead signal for his future proposals. In his new party members from Waterford he has got a good cross-section of the workers among them who must also have a good Dail Deputy and on that score I congratulate him on his victory.

HOW THE VOTES WENT

The Flanna Fail candidate polled a total of 12,181 first preference votes, compared with 13,109 in the General Election of April last year; a drop of 925 votes in a year of 9,617 votes improved his Party's position by 200 votes from 34% in the same period. That leaves us with the Labour Party's position. Last week they expressed disappointment at the results of the election, but added that the Labour candidate polled 5,783 votes out of this compares favourably with the vote of 6,693 received by their sitting member, Deputy Kyne, in the previous election.

Undoubtedly Labour were the 'poor party' of this election. They were poor in everything that matters, with the exception of a political seat, as is concerned. 


