A GENERAL CONTRIBUTION

Within the next few months the finance departments of our various local authorities will be busy calculating their estimates for the coming year.

Already the Health Authority and Agricultural and Vocational Committees have announced increases

totaling already something in the region of 2% in the £.

There is little under the present rating structure that local taxation can be reduced and there is no use in organisations like ours trying to do so.

The local authority rates as long as they are based on the existing system

is there any useful suggestion to be made? Even if the votes presented were not much

by shrewd political observers who watched the opening of the ballot boxes and followed the counting, it would be clear that the three candidates was fairly evenly divided with Mayor Griffin having a slight advantage.

These figures also take into account the placings of the Labour candidate Mr. Griffin and one of the other candidates holding a position alone is unfair and unacceptable.

A system more in line with the Income Tax code would feel more justified.

It must surely be accepted that the services and amenities provided by the local authorities to the people of the public lights, water and sewerage, to name but a few, are enjoyed not only by householders and ratepayers but by all members of the community.

With the average high-wages being earned by practically everyone in employment today it must be all the more proper that all should contribute to the cost of running local services.

As a matter of fact a number of these people earning big incomes have responsibility than many householders and other rated occupiers and their contributions would be well towards easing the general burden.

POLITICAL INQUISTS

The political interests in the result of the December by-election here are still going on and the whys and wherefores provided the topic of much political discussion over the Christmas holidays.

The Government were naturally jubilant that they scored a victory in the Waterford South constituency while the Fine Gael Party were also quietly pleased by the progress made in the election.

Local papers and radio stations showed they had made a good showing but there has been much criticism of the "failure" of the Fine Gael Party in the Waterford constituency.

Some of the political commentators in pre-election forecasts were tipping the party to win a seat.

These commentators all write in Dublin daily and Sunday papers and all kinds of wild allegations even to the extent of the sale of the Parish Secretary and the resignation of the Party Leader have been made.

The Labour leaders have been criticised for advocating a "Labour out" policy in the by-election and in this regard they have been blamed by the Fine Gael Party for losing the Waterford constituency.

The 1500 labour numbers was generally accepted as a big factor in the ultimate narrow

win of the Fine Gael candidate.

While this may be so in the view of the Fine Gael Party, the reality is that remains that the Labour Party did very well indeed.

THE PARISH OF CAPPoquin

Appos to my article in last week's issue on "The Parish of Cappoquin," Mr. Dermot O'Leary, Cappoquin, who is a member of the County Libraries Committee writes to

tell me that "The Parochial History of Waterford and Lismore" which I wrote in 1937 refers me to a further volume

"Waterford and Lismore" published by Canon Power in 1937.

He follows up his previous work not a mere revision, nor even a re-education of "The Parochial History of Waterford and Lismore" but a new and independent work without necessarily it incorporates practically all the material of the original.

In 1936 Canon Power produced a further volume "The Parish and Convent of Cappoquin" to mark the centenary of the foundation of the Mercy Convent in Cappoquin and in this he gives 1950 as the date of the establishment

of Cappoquin Parish. This additional information is that contained in the 1912 volume from which I quoted last week.

It was Bishop Sylvester Loyd of Waterford, Franciscan who constituted Cappoquin an independent Parish in that year with Fr. Michael Keating, a grand-nephew of the great Franciscan, Fr. Geoffrey Keating as pastor.

Bringing the succession of Pastors more up to modern times we find that Fr. P. J. Very Rev. Philip Denphy who was appointed Pastor in 1900 was elevated to the Diocesan Chapter and died in 1927.

He was succeeded in the following year by Canon Denis Whelan, a native of Dungarvan.
