### PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight

#### HIGHER COUNTY RATE

A warning to the ratepayers of the county that they would be faced with a tremendous rate increase for the coming financial year was given by Mr. Curran, Chairman of the Waterford County Council, when he spoke during a discussion on the adoption of the Health Services Estimate for the year at the monthly meeting of the Waterford Health Authority in Dungarvan last Monday.

Mr. Curran mentioned no specific amount but indicated that the increase would not be less than 20 per cent. If this is true and I have no reason to doubt what the County Council Chairman has stated in this regard, then the prospect facing the ratepayers is a near calamitous one.

Shopkeepers and small business concerns in the towns throughout the county will find themselves priced out of existence while farmers, at present engaged in fighting their rights campaign, will find themselves much worse off financially than ever.

There seems to be no end to the upward spiral of public expenditure year after year. The rate collectors seek more and more to keep the expensive machinery of Local Government moving.

#### INTERESTING FAMILY TREE

The recent death of Mr. Clay Frick Lynch at his home "Ballyduff," Greenboro, Pennsylvania, U.S.A., recalls a family association with the Old Burying Ground in Dungarvan. The late Clay Lynch was grandson of Patrick Lynch who was born at Ballyduff in 1822 and having married in 1850, emigrated to America where he died in 1910. A first cousin of the late Patrick Lynch was John Lynch who was grandfather of the late John Frick Lynch and father of Dr. M. J. Lynch, Toronto and of Mr. John Lynch who at present resides at the old home at Ballyduff, both of whom are third cousins of the late Clay Lynch whose death I have referred to above.

Clay Lynch was a man who took a deep interest in tracing his family tree and in 1944 he wrote to the late John Lynch, his cousin, who was then owner of Ballyduff, asking to have the family records examined towards this end. A most interesting and intriguing document resulted from his examination.

The oldest Register of baptisms in the parish runs from February 17, 1787 to April 17, 1788 and this records the christening of John Lynch on the 22nd November 1788. This John Lynch was the late Clay Lynch's great-grandfather while his brother James also recorded in the Register was great-grandfather of Dr. Lynch and of the present Mr. John Lynch.

Like his illustrious cousin, Dr. Frick Lynch, who has won the highest honours in the medical world, the late Clay Lynch won the name for himself in the world of commerce and for a number of years prior to his retirement, he was Vice-President and Superintendent of the Frick Coke Company, which he attended Georgetown University in Washington D.C.
