£76,000 SEWERAGE SCHEME PROPOSED FOR ABBEYSIDE

Mr. P. Doyle, Town Clerk, informed the members of Dungarvan Urban Council at their meeting last Friday night that the Co. With reference to your representations regarding Water Supply for Ballingown area the following is a copy of County Secretary's Report of 16th Inst.

It would not be economical to extend the Waterworks supply to this area, as apart from the length of the main required, pumping equipment would also be necessary.

There are two wells in the locality, one of them is maintained by the Co. Council, but neither of them would be adequate for a pumped supply.

There is, however, a privately owned pumped supply in the area and I am investigating the possibility of making some arrangement for the owner to use this as a source.

WARBLE FLY ERADICATION

The campaign for the eradication of the warble fly has been brought to an important stage further by the dressing of approximately 6,000 cattle with the systemic organophosphorus compounds during the dressing season which ended in December.

The Department is putting in hand immediately a comprehensive system of checking for warble fly certificates at farms, markets, fairs, export points, etc.

Checks will be made in the period March, July to determine the degree of infestation remaining in cattle.
