PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight

THE BOLD FENIAN MEN

March 5th, 1867, marked yet another abortive rising against British domination in Ireland, but although the men who went out then with their muskets and their pikes found that their cause was a failure, they were in fact successful in that they received with their blood and their dauntless spirit the life-line which can like a thread through Irish history and played a decisive part later in 1916 and again in 1921.

It is with pride, therefore, that every true Irishman recalls at this time the centenary of the sacrifice of those bold Fenian men and the honour we do them is no less than that which we gave to the heroes of Easter 1916 in the golden jubilee celebration last year.

Sixty-seven followed the rising of '48, also a failure and a year with other dreamed memories for Irishmen as it was one of the pestilential years. It was no wonder that the effort of 1848 was a doomed affair as the people, racked by starvation and disease, had neither the heart nor the strength to fight.

It was some of the young men of 1848 who in the Young Ireland Rising who twenty years later again came to the forefront of the Fenian Movement. Amongst them were James Stephens, Michael Doheny, Thomas Clarke-Loyd, John O'Mahony, John O'Leary and Charles Kickham. It was these veterans with men like Jeremiah O'Donovan Rossa to us now as O'Donovan Rossa and John Devoy, who were the leaders of the Fenian movement.

Stephens was born in Kilkenny in 1825 and was a civil engineer. He joined the Young Ireland Movement in 1848 and after the 1848 debacle escaped to America. To him is given the honour of being the recognised founder of Fenianism. He died in 1887.

O'Mahony was born in Kilkenny Co. Limerick in 1816. He was a graduate of Trinity College in 1845. He was arrested in 1848 and sent to Australia. When he came back to Ireland he travelled around the country, Stephens administering the Fenian oath. He also died in 1887.

O'Leary was born in 1830. The son of a successful shopkeeper in Tipperary he had never to work for a living. CIRCUIT COURT DECREE AGAINST TALLOW STUD FARMER

Sequel To Foal's Death

A decree for £140 with costs was awarded at Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday to Clement Victor Henley, farmer, Sheep Bay, Kilkenny, against William Henley, Tallow, arising from the death of a foal in August 1965.

In his civil bill claimed £500 damages arising from an alleged breach of an agreement entered between him and the defendant whereby defendant's wife Anthony was to be the plaintiff's mare and foal. In the event of the service being fruitful a service for 40 guineas was to be paid by plaintiff to defendant. Plaintiff claimed that when he sent the mare with her foal to defendant's stud farm for the service, defendant did not take proper care of the animal and did not feed them properly in consequence of which they were reduced to weak and starved condition and the foal subsequently died.

Defendant had a counter-claim for £75-5-8 being 40 guineas in respect of the service fee and for the keep of the animals.

Mr. McCarthy B.L., appearing for the plaintiff, stated that Mr. F. Morris B.L., instructed by Messrs. Carroll & Co., Solicitors, was for the defendant.

Mr. McCarthy opening the case said the claim arose from defendant's failure to look after the mare and her foal while the mare was at the defendant's stud for service between June 15 and August 2, 1965. Mr. McCarthy would tell the Court that the mare and foal were in the best of condition when he took them to Mr. Henley's place, but on their return they were emaciated and that she had no milk for the foal which died on August 28. Plaintiff's evidence was that the mare and foal were in the best of condition when they were taken to the defendant's place on June 15, 1965.
