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The Dungarvan people have been the ambition of many in the past but up to this it has merely been a pipe dream. There is no understanding, a number of technical difficulties where this project is concerned but I am sure we will have a win, a way to surmount these which will surely be found.

The third major project with which the Junior Chamber members are at present engaged is the establishment of a Civic Centre in the town. This is indeed a major and urgent importance, and any lead which Junior Chamber can give should be readily followed by the majority of people in the town and district.

The Old Town Hall is in near ruines, condition and cannot be used for any purpose, the facilities which are called for in this modern age.

Because of its dilapidated condition the estimated income from the hall for the working-class is less than £200 and as a result its maintenance will cost over £400 per annum.

In his report to the Urban Council, the recent annual estimates meeting, the County Manager referred to the Town Hall problem as follows: "The proposed increase on the Town Hall is due mainly to wages and there is a considerable reduction in income to the tune of £100 per annum.

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## Tallow and Round About Notes

**Late Mr. Maurice Ronayne.** The death occurred at his New Street residence, Tallow, last week, of Mr. Maurice Ronayne, deceased, who had reached the age of 84 years. He was one of the town's most popular residents. A man of the church, he stood well over six feet tall. He served in the Irish Army, and during World War I was seriously wounded by shrapnel. Very Rev. H. O'Brien, P.P., was Commandant, Boxing Champion of Ireland, he held for some years. Invested with the rank of Captain of the army owing to his wounds, he came back to his Murphy, Kinford, Tallow, native town where he has since resided. His son, John Joe, was killed at the rescue from Dunkirk early in the War. His death recalls an incident at the close of the Civil War in Ireland in 1923. The I.R.A. had a dump of arms in Monasterevin, Co. Kildare, from Tallow. The Free State Forces, in a search of the locality around the dump and removed the arms, and set a trap mine at the entrance. A member of the I.R.A. there late Tom Murphy, Lismore, then 19 years old, had the occasion to visit the dump. Not knowing that it had been discovered by enemy forces he lit a cigarette and threw it on the spring of a hand grenade with the safety pin removed. This action released the spike, killing him. His comrades were unaware of his fate and some days later found the body of Mr. Murphy, the son of Mrs. O'Brien, who was bringing water from a well. Word was received in Tallow and the late Mr. Ronayne single-handed went to the scene and carried the body on his shoulders across very rough woodland and brought it to a river where he had a boat. Then took the body to the old graveyard at Kilwaterney where it was buried by himself. After the "Cease Fire" the remains were brought for interment in his native Lismore.

The late Mr. Ronayne was a kind and gentle soul, a sincere friend. His death is deeply and deservedly regretted. He was brother of Mr. Paddy Ronayne, 1st Lt., 2nd Cork No. 2 Brigade Old I.R.A.

The remains, accompanied by a large cortège, were removed to the Ormonde Hotel, Parliament Street, by the Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries, and Mr. John Fahey, T.D., and Mrs. Fahey attended. Music was supplied by the Rev. M. Condon, C.C., Tallow.

The interment took place in the Kilwaterney cemetery in the presence of large attendants of mourners, friends and sympathizers.
