**UNEMPLOYMENT ASSISTANCE—ABOLITION OF EMPLOY-  
MENT PERIOD ORDERS**

The Minister for Social Welfare has made an Order revoking as from Wednesday 1 May 1967, the Employment Period Order, under which smallholders whose land valuations exceed £24 are disqualified from receiving unemployment assistance from 29th March 1967 to the 31st October 1967.

The smallholders are therefore no longer eligible for unemployment assistance again as from the 19th April 1967 under usual conditions.

Local Officers are sending to persons whose payments were stopped from the 29th March the necessary forms to enable them to assume their claims from the 18th April.

The Second Employment Period Order which would normally have been in operation in June next will not be issued.

Men in rural areas (including smallholders under £24) who have no dependants will not now be denied employment assistance from mid-June to end of October, etc.

In view of the fact that the Legal Adviser advised that the Association could, and should, manage its funds for the objects for which it was founded and the same resolution in relation to the funds should be rescinded.

All present at the Meeting unanimously agreed to rescind the previous resolution passed on the 12th October 1966, dealing with the funds and it was further decided that the Association would do everything possible to carry out the objects for which it was formed. The Chairman, Mr. Michael T. Tobin, Resolution had the approval of His Lordship, the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore. The Treasurer stated that the Association had clear title to all the funds of the Association and that all the funds should be disposed of the Association.






