There are some interesting statistics in the Annual Report of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture just published. The report shows that the total number of agricultural holdings in the county last year was 8,239 and that the average size was 28 acres. Of these 2,592 were of one acre or less while 5,447 were holdings of more than one acre. The average size of the holdings in the latter category was 55 acres.

Most widely sown crop was barley with a total acreage of 21,500 including 2,500 acres of milling barley. Oats with 12,200 acres came next with wheat 4,000 acres, turnips 3,800 acres, potatoes 2,600 acres, best 2,000 acres kale and field cabbages 1,200 acres, mangolds and other root crops 1,000 acres next in order.

There were 218,700 acres under pasture and 39,000 acres under hay and permanent meadow, while tree and berryed fruit and general horticulture accounted for nearly 600 acres. Mountain bog, waterways, and other uncultivated areas accounted for 1,071,400 acres in this section.
