## Behind the Spotlight

DEVELOPMENT PLANNING  
Dungarvan and an honourable position in the County Council. The Fats Cheoil medal has been recognised as the hallmark of the town and for the Urban area of Dungarvan which were approved within the last year. The importance has been attached to the development of local amenities to attract tourists.

Dungarvan, with a population of 21,000, the County Plan which deals with the whole county has shown a steady increase in population since 1911 to 36,699 in 1966. It adds that it will be the Council's policy to encourage development which would help to meet the demand. The attitude is a bold statement and in the absence of any positive suggestions is not worth very much to those who are continually being forced by economic circumstances to leave the land.

The reference to our declining numbers is well founded in view of the recent utterance of the Bishop of Cork at a West Cork Confirmation Ceremony on Confirmation Day:

"As an ordinary Irishman's love of Ireland and the Irish language is his disappearance to the native population." Dr. Lucy on the same occasion also stated: "No influx of tourists can compensate for the loss of the native flesh and blood. For tourists are but birds of passage."





## IT'S CHEAPER at MOLONEYS

**Labour Party Ratifies  
Local Elections  
Candidates**

A convention of the County City Branches of the Labour Party was held in the Courthouse, Dungarvan on Sunday last.

Mr. Sean Tracy, T.D., Glenamel presided and over eighty delegates from the City and County Branches attended. Mr. T. Kyne, T.D., was also present.

Deputy Tracy in his opening speech said he was very honoured and delighted to be asked to preside at the convention because he felt a special interest in the result of the local elections in County Waterford because a large part of the County had been transferred to the South Tipperary Constituency for Dail elections. This, said Deputy Tracy, "was not done by a Flannan Fail Government with any consideration for Waterford representation, with the clear intention of defeating the Labour Representatives in South Tipperary."

"The God," said Deputy Tracy, "the reservoir of the people of Waterford and South Tipperary was shown at this party, this is reflected both in the high turnout myself at the head of the poll."

**COMMON MARKET FEARS**

Deputy Tracy went on to deal with the importance of the Labour Party in the coming years when Ireland might be forced to associate with huge industrial firms from Western Europe and Great Britain. If we were permitted to enter the Common Market, both Flannan Fail and Cumann na Gaedheal appeared to accept the entry of Ireland and all its difficulties without concern but the Labour Party representing as it does the ordinary workers, were fearful of the employment hardship that might arise from unfair competition from outside the country.

**OUR REPRESENTATION**
