The Government is using every means at its disposal to keep the need for constant vigilance before the people. The necessary precautions are being stressed at every available opportunity but if all concerned do not respond in a proper manner to the calls which are being shouted from Press, television and radio all will be in vain.

We all know the calamitous results which an outbreak would mean to this country. Internally everything possible is being done. All sporting fixtures have been banned and many social activities have been curtailed. No one has quibbled over this rather than many of the farming community (let that more stringent measures should be enforced).

The big danger is in the cross-channel movement of people, especially from England to this country. An oversight by some innocent traveller could well prove the undoing of all the ground work done up to this time.

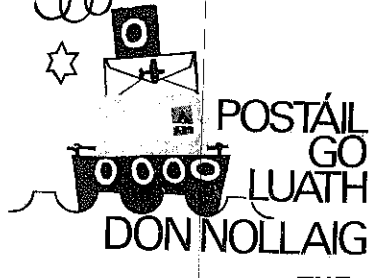

**DISTRICT COURT APPEALS BEFORE CIRCUIT JUDGE**

When Michael Coughlan (29), Sligo, Tallow, appeared at Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday against a sentence of one month's imprisonment imposed on him at Fallow District Court on March 1st last, when he was convicted of being drunk and disorderly at Convent Street, Fallow on February 25, Judge Fawcett told him that he was going to increase the sentence to one of two months but would make it suspensory if defendant was prepared to enter a plea of guilty to keep the peace for two years.

When Coughlan agreed to enter the bond the Judge told him "go away now and behave yourself and if I ever see you here again you'll get six months." He then advised the defendant's father and told him you don't get any more and see that he keeps out of trouble for the future.

**DOE TO THREAT OF FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE**

**DUNGARVAN APPEAL ADJOURNED**

An appeal by Michael Dugan against a sentence of two months imprisonment imposed on him at Dungarvan District Court when he was convicted of being drunk and disorderly at Convent Street, Fallow on February 25, was adjourned by consent until the next session.

I can't interfere with the sentence imposed on you, the Judge told Anthony Dugan (35) in fixed abode but stated to be a native of Dublin when he appeared before the Court in custody on appeal against the severity of a sentence of 12 months imprisonment imposed on him at Dungarvan when he was convicted on two charges of housebreaking and attempted robbery at Clonmel on June 2, and stole 50s. He had attempted to steal a cash box with 25 from the shop of Mrs. Arthur, O'Connell Street, earlier the same day but was foiled.

Sgt. M. O. Murchu, Clonmel, said that Whelan had started his criminal career in 1940 and had been before the courts for a variety of offences on 25 occasions since then. He had been deported from England where he worked for a period as a labourer and had been in and out of jail since 1965.

Whelan appeared to the Judge for another chance promising to go straight for the future. "You have already served 5 months of your term, he told him, and I feel that when you are in prison a little longer your conviction about going straight may be a little stronger. For that reason I can't interfere with your sentence."

FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE

a reminder of the prohibitions and precautions now in force

Imports from Britain of four-footed animals, meat and meat products, milk and cream, plants, wool, fertilisers containing animal matter, used vehicles and agricultural machinery, and certain other commodities, have been stopped. The importation of used clothing or used footwear through the post from Britain is forbidden and all parcels containing such clothing or footwear received at Irish parcel post depots are automatically returned. A thorough screening and disinfection of passengers entering the country by sea and air is in operation. All baggage must be opened for inspection by officers of the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries. Any meat or meat product found in baggage is being confiscated and the owner is liable to prosecution. Soiled clothing and footwear are liable to confiscation. The crews of all ships entering the State are being disinfected and the entry of unauthorised persons to such ships while in port is forbidden. Persons who have been in Britain within the previous three weeks are prohibited from entering marts, creameries, meat factories, A.I. stations, cold stores, flour and grain, mills, fertiliser factories and certain other premises. All cattle fairs and shows, horse and dog racing, coursing, hunting, shooting, fishing and certain other sports have been banned. Close liaison is being maintained between the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries and the Ministry of Agriculture in Belfast so as to ensure the fullest co-ordination of disease prevention measures in both areas. Instructions about the precautionary measures to be taken have been issued to local marts; A.I. stations, the Advisory Service, to the outdoor staffs of Government Departments and to many others.

The instructions include: 'Keep visitors from your farm especially those who may have come from Britain, and stay away from other people's livestock yourself.', 'Keep on the alert — inspect all your livestock daily and report any suspicious symptoms immediately to the Gardaí, the District Veterinary Office or a Veterinary Surgeon.', 'Place straw soaked with disinfectant and a footbath at the entrance to your farm.', 'Without your full co-operation the risk to your own stock and to the whole country is greatly increased.', 'Prevail upon your relatives and friends in Britain not to visit Ireland while the present emergency lasts. If some people feel they must come, advise them to: Travel light bringing only recently laundered clothing; Leave all working clothes behind and so avoid having them confiscated; Complete the card supplied to them en route conscientiously and honestly and report to the officials of the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries on arrival; While in the country stay away from livestock and farms.'

TWISTED ANKLE LEADS TO COMPENSATION CLAIM

Judge Refers Case To Medical Referee

The extent of the partial incapacity of the applicant was referred for determination to a medical referee by Judge Fawcett at Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday. The applicant was Bernard McCarthy (33), Adamore, Killybeggs, a builder's labourer, who brought a claim under the Workmen's Compensation Act against P. J. Lyons & Co., Building Contractors, Ormonde Estate, Waterford, arising from an injury to his ankle sustained while he was working for the respondents on April 1967.

Mr. J. Carroll, B.L., instructed Farrell & Morrissey, Solicitors, for the applicant said that compensation had been paid up to the end of July and had then been cut off. His pre-accident earnings had been agreed at £12 per week and compensation at the rate of £4-10-0 per week had been paid.

Mr. Bernard McCarthy said that while working for the contractors on a building in April 25 he came out of an opening in the building and landed on a scaffold. He landed on a loose plank and sprained his left ankle. He was taken to Arden Hospital where he was treated. The ankle was still very painful and he could only walk a little distance before it swelled. He tried to get work from local farmers recently but had to give up the jobs he got after a few days because of the pain he got in his leg. He thought he could do light work but there was nothing suitable where he lived.

Dr. Louis N. Gleeson said the applicant named under his care in July. He found the ankle injured involving the partial tearing of two ligaments. The applicant's work on level ground he thought he should be able to do it but movement on rough surfaces would prove a hazard. He felt that there was nothing but weakness in the ankle and that it would never be 100 per cent again.

Dr. Thomas O'Neill for the respondents said that his examination of the ankle had not sprained his ankle but had now made a full recovery. In his opinion the applicant was now fit for full work as a builder's labourer.

Dr. John Babin, Dungarvan, said that he also examined the injured ankle but could find no swelling. He had it x-rayed and the x-rays showed no abnormality. He could find no good reason why the applicant should not return to work.

Judge Fawcett found that applicant did sprain his ankle while working for the respondents in April and that his incapacity was total up to the date of the hearing. He referred the matter to a medical referee to determine compensation at the full rate of £4-10-0 per week would be paid up to October 1st.

Minister Says No To Five Day Week For Forestry Workers—Mr. John Fahey, T.D., has received a further reply to his representations in regard to a five day week for Tallow Forestry workers as follows: 'In answer to your recent representation on behalf of Forestry workers in the Tallow area regarding the question of a reduced working week for Forestry employees, I am advised by Mr. O'Malley, Minister for Lands to state that he has made enquiries into the matter. The Minister is advised that in common with the great majority of smaller workers in other Government Departments, employees of the Forestry Division are required to work a 45 hour week at the best round. They enjoy a five day week except during a period of about 3 months from late October until early February, when because of conditions of light, it would not be possible to work 45 hours in a five day week and accordingly employees are required to work on Saturday mornings. An attempt is made to reduce the 45 hour week into operation as recently as 1964, there are no proposals at present to make any reduction in these hours.

Grouping Of Stream At West Street—Mr. John Fahey, T.D., has received the following communication from the Secretary of Waterford County Council regarding the grouping of the stream at West Street, Tallow: 'A Chára, I am to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 20th November in connection with the above. 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DECLARE LISMORE UNDEVELOPED AREA

Move By Town Commissioners

At a meeting of Lismore Town Commissioners which was attended by Dalí Deputies for the area, the matter of having the district declared an undeveloped area and its industrial needs generally were discussed. Present were Mr. J. Fahey, T.D., Mr. S. Treacy, T.D., and Mr. P. Hogan, T.D. An apology for inability to attend was received from Mr. D. Savers, T.D., Parliamentary Secretary for Agriculture and Fisheries. The Chairman, Mrs. R. Campbell, welcomed the Deputies and thanked them for their attendance.

Mr. Fahey said that in reply to a Parliamentary question of his the Minister had not agreed to his request. He had not been able to get work from local farmers recently but had to give up the jobs he got after a few days because of the pain he got in his leg. He thought he could do light work but there was nothing suitable where he lived.

Dr. Louis N. Gleeson said the applicant named under his care in July. He found the ankle injured involving the partial tearing of two ligaments. The applicant's work on level ground he thought he should be able to do it but movement on rough surfaces would prove a hazard. He felt that there was nothing but weakness in the ankle and that it would never be 100 per cent again.

Dr. Thomas O'Neill for the respondents said that his examination of the ankle had not sprained his ankle but had now made a full recovery. In his opinion the applicant was now fit for full work as a builder's labourer.

Dr. John Babin, Dungarvan, said that he also examined the injured ankle but could find no swelling. He had it x-rayed and the x-rays showed no abnormality. He could find no good reason why the applicant should not return to work.

Judge Fawcett found that applicant did sprain his ankle while working for the respondents in April and that his incapacity was total up to the date of the hearing. He referred the matter to a medical referee to determine compensation at the full rate of £4-10-0 per week would be paid up to October 1st.

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
