**DANGER NOT YET PASSED**  
While present day to day reports of outbreaks of Foot and Mouth disease in England would seem to indicate that the fury of the disease has spent itself and that the worst is over, it is still far too early for anyone in this country to become complacent about the observance of all the usual precautions.

Up to the present we have, except for a few odd cases, shown what can be achieved by co-operative effort. The Government and Department of Agriculture were quick on the alert when the disease first appeared in England and at once set about enforcing measures aimed at prohibiting the spread of the plague to this country.

How successful the efforts of the Government and all concerned farmers, Gardai, Sheehans, the general public (and this includes everyone who walks the streets)—have been is displayed in the fact that we have so far been able to keep the epidemic of foot and mouth disease from crossing the Channel through travel and commerce between this country and England. When we come to think that at one stage there were no more than about sixty miles of the Irish sea between us and the nearest outbreak it is not difficult to realize how fortunate we have so far been.

However the danger is not passed for us. Indeed those latter stages of the outbreak in this country as people may be inclined to relax too soon and believe that the need for continued observance of the strictest and most stringent precautions has passed.

As I have said we have all shown marvellous co-operation in saving our livestock and consequently the prosperity of our country up to this. Let there be no relaxation of the effort until the danger is really gone and that will not be for three weeks after the last confirmed case of the disease has been reported in England. With God's help let us continue the hard work of self-preservation.

**NO PLACE FOR THEM**

## SALARIES AND BOOKS MEAN INCREASE IN COUNTY LIBRARIES ESTIMATE

Waterford County Libraries Committee at a meeting in Dungarvan approved of an estimate of £21,822 for the year 1968-69 as presented by the County Librarian, Mrs. K. Hayes.

## FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE

Mr. T. J. President, these involved not to allow any complacency in the efforts to keep the disease out of the country.

"I must emphasize," he said, "that at this stage there are grounds whatsoever for any let-up in the efforts to keep out the disease. With the attention from the British Ministry of Agriculture that new outbreaks are expected to continue well into February, the end of our worries is by no means in sight yet."

Mr. Maher continued: "In certain quarters, people who have not understood the position, have been accused of advocating a complete closure of the ports during the danger period. We do not advocate a complete closure of the ports at any stage. We consistently advocated a ban on inward passenger traffic, except under strict permit. This would not mean a complete closure of the ports and airports. The ports and airports would not have to be closed in any way. It could be quite easily controlled—the position is entirely different with human beings."

Mr. Maher paid a special tribute to the N.F.A. members and their families for the Border during the Christmas period had gone to no little inconvenience to make duty a little more pleasant for Gardai on Border patrol. It was an unenviable assignment for the Gardai during this period and we are sure the small gestures made of tea, soup, shelter or other items were fully appreciated by the men on duty.

"We must all continue to cooperate to the full with all those who are making every effort to ensure that we are spared the disaster of foot and mouth disease," Mr. Maher concluded.

"During the past year we achieved record figures in membership and subscription income. It must be our objective to beat these records in 1968."
