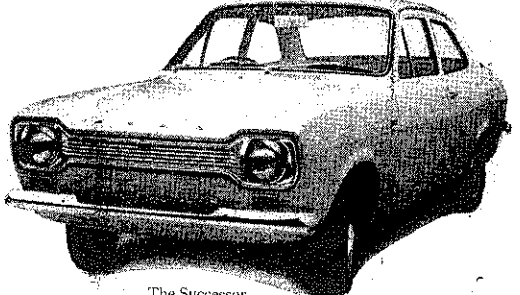

Very Rev. W. Cahill, P.P.
