WATERFORD DELEGATES AT THURLES I.C.M.S.A. MEETING

Mr. William J. Kennedy, Borehall, Chairman, presided at a recent meeting of County Tipperary and Waterford executives of the I.C.M.S.A. in Thurles and said that judging by the presence of so many delegates it was very apparent that the members of the I.C.M.S.A. were taking a deep and practical interest in their organisation. He realised the benefits they had received by way of increases in the price of milk through the efforts of the I.C.M.S.A. and the necessity of having a strong viable organisation to guard their interests. The rank and file members fully appreciated the united effort, animated with a spirit of courage and buoyancy no matter the obstacles encountered. It was he added a tribute to the dairy farmers that the I.C.M.S.A. today was in a flourishing condition. Mr. Jerry Harrington, Knockmal, said the creamery industry was the corner stone of Tipperary's leading industry. The history up to this had been too little and too late, only for the efforts of the I.C.M.S.A. down the years the traditional dairy farmer would be a thing of the past. Only a substantial increase in the price of milk, corn, and pigs would satisfy the farmers of County Waterford. MODIFICATION OF FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE REGULATIONS I. FISHING, SHOOTING, POINT-TO-POINT RACE MEETINGS, HUNTING, COUSING, MOTOR CAR AND MOTOR CYCLE SPORTS The restrictions on these sports will be removed on and from 22nd February (i.e. midnight 21st/22nd February, 1968), subject to (1) and (2) below. (1) In connection with the resumption of these activities, it is to be noted that, under the Foot and Mouth Disease (Restriction on the Movement of Persons) Order, 1965, persons from Britain and other countries, who are in possession of a passport or other document, may not, for a period of twenty-one days after arrival in this country, go in or on to any similar premises or places in Ireland: (a) any wholesale meat market; (b) any premises in which meat or meat products are processed for sale other than a retail premises or catering establishment; (c) any artificial insemination station; (d) any creamery or other premises in which milk is subjected to any process or is handled; (e) any cold store which is used for the storage of meat or any other animal or milk product; (f) any other building or any other land, on which animals were present or to which animals had access at the time when the person was in the building or on the other land, in or in relation to any of these places or premises must not allow any person subject to the movement restrictions to enter the premises or land. (2) The resumption of point-to-point meetings will also be subject to the conditions (including licensing) which apply to other race meetings. II. PUBLIC SALES AND SHOWS OF LIVESTOCK On and from Thursday, 29th February, 1968 (i.e. midnight 28th/29th February, 1968), trading generally may be resumed and fairs, Farmers and traders, as well as Markets, are strongly urged to keep records of all sales and purchases of cattle, sheep and pigs. Shows of cattle, sheep and pigs may be held on and from Monday, 11th March, 1968 (i.e. midnight 10th/11th March, 1968). The Department will inform Show authorities as to the details of these arrangements.
